PATRON'S REPORT

Dear fellow Bronte Members

I would like to congratulate and thank all our members for your dedication during this 2019/2020 season.

Our Patrol season has come to an end, but not in its traditional format, due to the Covid 19 virus pandemic. Despite the change in circumstances Bronte Surf Lifesavers continued to keep Bronte Beach safe, by maintaining surveillance patrols until Waverley Council closed the beach and erected barricades.

Seeing Bronte barricaded up and the beach closed to ensure social distancing reminded me of a tale from our legendary Patron Frank Norton, who described Bronte when it was barricaded up with barbed wire during the war years in 1941, not to stop people from using the beach, but to "stop any force from coming in.... with two machine guns located on the north and south end".

Frank was a mere 21 years old and was training in an infantry battalion, he heard there was a call for volunteers for machine gunners and thinking of the guns down at Bronte and Bondi thought "That'll do me" so he signed up, convincing a couple of mates to sign up as well, only to find themselves a few weeks later in the jungles of New Guinea. "He wasn't the most popular chap with his mates". Eventually the barbed wire fencing came down, and normal activities resumed at Bronte, much the same as the removal of the barricades currently, with the easing of social distancing restrictions. Strange times, indeed.

To all our volunteer patrolling members thank you for your dedication and commitment to keep our community safe.

Congratulations, go to our Club Captain James McLennan on leading our frontline services, well done. To James and wife Kirsty, their role in the remarkable out of hours rescue of nine people in the notorious Bronte Express rip in February was extraordinary. It was truly one of the most incredible rescues performed at Bronte and their efforts have been described as heroic.

Bronte Surf Club has a proud record of " no lives lost while a Patrol was on duty " and the skills and bravery demonstrated in this rescue, highlights the high standard that our patrolling members are trained.

The recognition by Surf Life Saving Sydney and Surf Life Saving NSW as Rescue of the Month was very well deserved.

Bronte Surf Club is in very good shape and extremely well led with President Basil Scaffidi, the Board of management and leadership team, and Peter Butcher and the dedicated office team.

Bronte Surf Club is in the process of a massive undertaking to develop a new Surf Club, incorporating facilities for our members and our frontline patrolling operations, and all involved should be thanked for the efforts led by our Club President.

Thank you to all our wonderful members, for your passion and service over the course of the 2019/2020 season and we look forward to a bigger and better season at Bronte Beach.

Just when you thought patrolling one of the most difficult beaches in NSW was already a challenge, along comes COVID-19. Our club was one of the first Sydney (if not the first) to close it's clubhouse and be a strong advocate for the initial closing of beaches. We were applauded for our leadership, and I want to thank everyone involved in that process. It was a strange and eerie sight to see the beach with barricades.

The diligence of our volunteers was never more evident this year than when we were involved with three different after hour mass rescues including the incredible night of Saturday, 1 February where our Club Captain James McLennan led an amazing group of members to save 11 people. This recue(s) was awarded Sydney Branch rescue of the year. Not only was it a testament to James and his wonderful leadership, but to our club as an organisation and it is one of the proudest moments for the club in recent history.

This year, our members carried out an extraordinary 6915 preventative actions which led to the need for only 95 actual rescues. This is testament to the dillgence of our lifesavers and a fantastic outcome. I am so proud in the growth of our lifesaving capabilities. 
Our IRB team were again brilliantly lead by Dominic Villa. We congratulate Hugh Webster, this year's IRB Person of the Year.

Initially our club provided volunteers to go into the detention centres to speak to the juveniles in detention about the roles of surf life savers and encourage them to learn life saving skills. Our aim was to 'create a better life outlook' for the juveniles.

Over the years there have been many different groups that have come with Uniting Care from family groups to this year's group of Nursing Home residents. The surf club organises our club volunteers to guide the groups and keep them safe while they have a day at the beach θ swim in the ocean but it is the BBQ lunch and interaction with the volunteers that they enjoy just as much.

We hope to continue this association as it means a lot to both the Uniting groups as well as our members.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Captains Log 2019-20

What a season hey ... hang on ... didn't I say that last season?

Yet again Bronte Beach delivered with season 2019-20 presenting a particularly challenging Summer with a twist. A summer that saw MASSIVE crowds in the park and water well into the evenings with Club members conducting thousands of preventative actions and guite a few rescues. These actions were often performed in testing conditions whilst dealing with difficult people. Yes Xmas, Boxing and Australia day I'm looking at you!

Year on year I believe a good measure of our growing capability as is to have our recorded rescue numbers going down with preventions inversely going up, stabilising and reducing over time through better public education.

Statistically our members conducted over 8000 preventatives. These were balanced out by over 100 rescues conducted either during Patrol or after-hours. As much as we all enjoy the success of a good rescue or two, a notable reduction

in recorded rescue stats are positive when they are measured against preventative actions and targeted awareness programs.

This means members are observing, acting and therefore preventing before a board, duck or other method rescue needs to be initiated by the Club or Lifeguards. Pivotal charts aside, we can yet again proudly report "no lives lost", mission accomplished. I had the privilege to be involved in some of those rescues. To see the level of skill, selfless duty of care, teamwork and follow up that our Club members are routinely displaying for each other and the community is truly inspiring.

The quality of First Aid treatment and follow up was also of a higher quality this year.

I encourage members to take up further advanced awards and external training in those areas as we are more often called upon to be Lifesavers and First Responders beyond the flags. Utilising such skills forged at the Club, quite a few members have directly assisted or are still providing aid to other agencies and communities as part of the Bushfire relief and COVID-19 pandemic management.

from strength to strength in the last few seasons. The cohesion, cooperation and hybrid mix across Patrolling, Nippers, Competition and management has never been better. We are all getting in the water and catching the same wave, or better still encouraging others onto it, enjoying the ocean that bonds us.

Patrol teams are becoming stronger with excellent collaborative leadership shown by the next gen PC's and VC's. Of course, the true strength in the Patrols relies in the depth of experience and enthusiasm in the patrol base which is being lifted by the excellent standard of new Bronzies joining the ranks. Patrollers and Water Safety are asking more and more can we do extra training or upskilling and how can we spin this out to assist the wider community.

As part of this supported process, we are finding a variety of members are stepping up to mentor and assist. They are doing this in their own time, not for renumeration, medals or accolades but to ensure everyone has the supported opportunity to be a relevant part of the team.

All this small team training and mentoring which feeds the one club larger skills and engagement groups could not exist without a solid baseline of standards and direction. Well done to the Education Team for an outstanding year of training and commitment to excellence. In particular we should recognise and respect the sheer number of trainers and the hours required for the planning and execution of the new format for Skills Maintenance.

I'd particularly like to mention this would not have been possible without the efforts of Emily Harrison, Ryan Tindal, Jackson Raymond, Ruk De Silva and Max Gonzales, ably managed by Sam

Bronte Surf Club as an operational whole has gone Stone and of course backed up by Kimberley Johns. Proficiencies were enthusiastically embraced this season by members. The small-team multi-station scenario-based method, which is managed by a subject matter expert, has received excellent feedback from participants and is the way forward. The value was immediately evident in the improved knowledge, confidence and performance of both Water Safety teams and Patrollers.

> It was inspiring to see the SRC transition from Nipper to junior Lifesavers this year. This was most capably led by Head of Cadets, Amber Brown who invested significant time and energy in ensuring the framework was in place to keep our very competent cadets engaged. This is a challenge for all Surf Clubs and the support of Steve and Sunday morning Patrol teams was invaluable. Integrating those highly capable and respected Junior Lifesavers into the Patrols is a force multiplier .. and a lot of rewarding fun.

Once again great to see the renewed care and respect given to club equipment by members. I would particularly like to thank the growing group of volunteers that put their hands up to take on small repairs and maintenance of our rescue boards. Ivan, Tamera, Jen Penguin, Geoff and Mark to name a few please take a bow.

These ongoing efforts ensure as an Emergency Service we are rescue ready 24/7. Equipment damage aside, it's great to see so many more have "Training Hard to Rescue Easy" right from their first Patrol and continually throughout the year so they can act without warning or hesitation due to the improved confidence in their skills.

And then things got weirder



Covid-19 became a real and present danger, Bondi Beach was shut with minimal warning and the terms Lockdown, Social Distancing and Flouting became the norm. Bronte was an early adopter of recognising the immediate need of putting in safety and operational procedures to ensure member safety whilst setting a solid lead by example direction for the community. As such we were one of the first Clubs to cancel group events, put in safe handling procedures, setup restricted access and triage areas with supplies.

This was not undertaken lightly however it was enacted without hesitation to ensure our volunteers were respected and better protected by removing them from risk once we knew the fences were going up. Despite the hard closures of the Bronte Beach, rest assured we aren't "off duty" as a robust callout team of the usual suspects has been setup to aid the Council Lifequards, SLS support Operations and other combat agencies if the need arises.

Over the last few months we have all had to navigate the rapidly changing tides of information and uncertainty as the country comes to grips with Covid-19. With the obvious increased levels of anxiety and rapidly imposed changes to our normal ways of life, it is important to focus on the positives, be they a point in time "marker can" of normality to paddle (or run) back towards mentally and then physically as a team when the time is right. Now is a good time to pause, review, learn and be ready for what lies ahead hopefully all being a bit wiser, thankful and more considerate of others.

One Club member who has truly stood out is Macarena Navarrete Balart ... Macca. The daily encouragement, direction, care and positive feedback she has provided to her growing band of sandy beach and 440 runners is exclamatory. Videos, chat groups, strava maps, running and stretching programs all off her own back. I would personally like to take this opportunity to thank her and the amazing Bronte Club members for the selfless contributions, dedication and community spirit during these unusual times.

Unfinished business ...

It's easy to forget the Summer Australia caught on fire, countless lives and livelihoods were lost or forever changed. We were all inspired by the generous acts of Lifesaving members paying things forward by making numerous trips down south to support the affected communities or by providing substantial financial aid to those in need. So much more needs to be done in those regions as our collective job is not finished down South.

As a Club member you soon realise that the role of Lifesaving is so much beyond the flags as we ensure the safety of the vulnerable and those in need. Saving lives ... that is what Bronte Lifesavers do!

Lastly. I would like to thank the Board of Management, Admin team and family members who put in or put up with countless hours, on the beach or behind the scenes. Please take some time to reflect and appreciate the efforts of others who strive to ensure we not only provide a valued service today but also evolve as part of positive sea of inclusive and relevant change.

RESCUE OF THE YEAR SATURDAY 1 FEBRUARY

A mass rescue that was described as incredible and heroic, has won lifesavers James and Kirsty McLennan the Sydney Branch Rescue of the Year Award for saving the lives of nine people who were caught in the notorious Bronte Beach rip and swept hundreds of metres out to sea

The award-winning rescue occurred at 7.45pm in the evening on Saturday 1 February. James McLennan, Club Captain at Bronte Surf Club, and his wife Kirsty were relaxing at their home at Bronte Beach. The sun was going down and light was fading fast.

James noticed a large group of people caught in the notorious Bronte Beach rip. They were in considerable distress and were being swept quickly out to sea. Thinking quickly, he ran to Bronte Surf Club to grab a rescue board.

"As I ran down, I could hear a lot of screaming and yelling coming from the beach. I could see at least six people in trouble. The conditions were pretty nasty. It was choppy and there was a lot of moving water around. There was a strong north-east wind blowing which made paddling out more difficult," James said

James' wife Kirsty, who had followed James to the beach, also grabbed a rescue board from the club and dived into the rip. So did several other off-duty surf lifesavers and two off-duty Waverly Council lifeguards who had seen James' request for assistance via the 'WhatsApp' message. They arrived a short time later to assist.

On call Duty officer Matt Evans arrived at Bronte Beach 15 minutes after being tasked by Police. He quickly realised the scale of the incident and requested the Toll Ambulance Rescue Helicopter attend to assist with the search and rescue in the fading light. He also confirmed that NSW Ambulance paramedics were on the way to assist.

After James reached the swimmers caught in the rip, he realised there were actually nine people in the group. "One guy was in a particularly bad way. He had ingested a lot of water and was drifting in and out of consciousness. He was frothing at the mouth and I had to clear his airway several times while I was paddling him back to the beach on my board." James said

All nine of the swimmers that were rescued from the rip by surf lifesavers were brought back safely to Bronte beach for assessment and treatment.

Matt Spooner, Support Operations Manager, Sydney Branch, at Surf Life Saving NSW said that James McLennan's rescue was heroic.

"It was the most incredible rescue I've ever heard of. It was full-on heroic. James' efforts that day saved the lives of nine people - without doubt," said Matt Spooner.

James says that the successful rescue was a team effort and gives credit to all Bronte Surf Life Saving Club members and Waverly Council Lifeguards who assisted on the day. He also credits the focused rescue board training provided by the club.

The bushfires around Sydney over the summer saw Bronte on alert to assist with water-based evacuations, and a special thanks to Jason King and to Andrew Ferguson for preparing a boat at short notice and having it available for deployment at short notice.


Last, but not least, God bless Kimberly Johns, without whom I could not perform this role.





Unfortunately, the Gold Medallion Assessment that was meant to be held at Bronte on the 21st March was cancelled the day prior. I am not sure that Jenny Austin, Kimberly Johns, James McLennan, Tara O'Reilly, Ivan Power, Jackson Raymond, Andrew Ugarte, and Paul Wenck – would be too happy to have a Gold Medallion Assessment sprung on them. Congratulations must go for all of their effort training for the Gold Medallion, it was the largest squad we have had in a very long time.

Our training team has put in a phenomenal effort this season. This was part of a season focussed on upskilling members. The new format for Skills Maintenance meant more time from trainers and assessors was needed to deliver the program. I received mostly positive feedback from members and I hope that everyone found the experience worthwhile and their skills better developed.

When I asked trainers why they contributing their time training – which is at least 30 hours for a bronze course, plus 2 hours for each skills maintenance in addition to their own patrols and the like they said:

Officer endorsements this season. Ryan Tindall for upskilling as an IRB Trainer and ARTC Trainer, and Paul Wenck as an ARTC Trainer. Betsy Rumble and Macarena Navarrete Balart are also well on their way to becoming trainers.

When I became Chief Training Officer one measure of personal success was to grow the number of trainers so that I did not need to train a course. I am pleased to say that I achieved that this season. It has been great to grow the pool of trainers and diversify the skillset.

Andrew Ferguson gave SRC Training a go. The SRC has been a journey of continual improvement and Steve Tindale has stepped forward to look after cadet education for next season.


Beyond the formal training program informal Board Training and Wednesday Mornings with Garry lift everyone's skills and are critical to the success of the program.

This year a record 819 children registered for the Bronte Nippers program with the growth mostly due to higher retention rates in the U9-U11 age groups. We also had a record number off 44 young adults graduate from nippers with their SRC, many of this U14 age group had started in U6's and went all the way through, this was also a very strong competitive group over the years.

It wasn't an easy season with the beach closed on quite a number of weekends and some carnivals including Sydney Branch unable to be held due to rough surf conditions. Unfortunately that is surf life saving and we will always put child safety first. Despite being a small beach Bronte is fortunate to have the ocean pool and the Bogey Hole available so that nippers will at least always be able to have a swim.

Our 'Yellow Cap' program is a great way to introduce new parents to helping out at nippers and is leading to an increasing number of parents undertaking their Bronze Medallion and further supporting their children through water safety. This is a great way for parents to set an example for their children and to genuinely increase their water skills and first aid. I encourage all parents to gain this qualification.

Volunteers are the back-bone of running nippers and once again we had Col, Marty and Kirsty running the U6 program making nippers as much fun as possible for the first timers. All other

age managers are nipper parents and they do a great job of supporting a range of capability across their age group. We always encourage kids to undertake still water swimming lessons to help improve their confidence and capability in the surf. Our Sunday morning emphasis is on participation and fun not competition.





Our Cadet members are 13 – 15 years old and have completed their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and graduated out of Nippers into the senior club. Our Youth members, who are 15 – 18 years old and have completed their Bronze Medallion. This crew patrol our beach on Sunday mornings under the generous guidance of the Patrol Captains, they perform water safety for the Nippers and regular patrol duties on their three-

The 2019-20 season saw us in the very fortunate position of having over 120 Cadet and Youth members patrolling our beach. This number included the record-breaking 44 SRC graduates who graduated into the senior club in November. Over 70 of them completed over their minimum patrol hour requirement, including seven who patrolled more than 40 hours in a shortened season!

We completed our second season of Sunday morning patrols for all our Cadet and Youth members. This routine allows a seamless transition from Sunday morning Nippers to Sunday morning patrolling for our Cadets. It provides an opportunity for them to engage with and mentor the Nippers in the water while taking on the responsibility of patrol requirements. I want to acknowledge the guidance and direction provided by the Sunday morning Patrol Captains, thank you to each of you for your assistance, enthusiasm and patience.

Thank you to Steve Tindale for his invaluable assistance this season. Steve paid a crucial role in training the graduating SRC candidates. After graduation, his leadership on the beach every Sunday morning resulted in a more engaged, more trained, more directed and more enthused patrol group.

Due to the early end of the season, we had only one intake for the Cadet Bronze course, which saw eight newly minted bronzies join our ranks.

As always, enormous thanks to the education and training team for your patience, good humour and flexibility. Extra thanks to Sam Stone for running an IRB crew course that allowed two of our Youth members to join the IRB team.

IRB TEAM MEMBER: HUGH WEBSTER


Hugh completed his Bronze Medallion in March 2019, and pretty much fast-tracked himself towards being an IRB Driver, completing the Crew course in September 2019 and then the Driver's course in December 2019.

Hugh's award is a recognition of two very different attributes that he has demonstrated this season.

The first is his willingness to step into the breach when there are gaps in our roster, especially when these have occurred at the last minute. PATROL OF THE YEAR: PATROL 5



Qualities such as vigilance, application of skill, knowledge, leadership and selfless duty of care whilst in the service of others encompass parts of this award as does having a robust questioning sense of humour which brings a smile to others during a difficult day. Despite being a quiet achiever (your mileage may vary, ask Phil or anyone on the other end of a radio), Bill DeAruio demonstrates all of these admirable qualities in passionate spades. His calm management of the beach and diligent interaction with multiple assets and

agencies during parallel incidents this season is a testament to his strength of character and duty of care.

Over the last 10 seasons Bill has diligently patrolled Bronte Beach, logging up over 490 Red and Yellow voluntary patrol hours between the flags. As a jack of all trades, Bill is often found fulfilling the multi skilled role of Patroller, VC, stand in PC, mentor and an honest mate to many. Beyond the flags, Bill is still remembered for his key starring role as part of the Phil and Bill Bronze Medallion show where he excelled as a trainer not only at the beach, but also the classroom and associated surf club bar which he still manages to run a master class at today.

Of equal importance, Bills pre and post event PASSIONATE briefing and follow up has ensured over the years that no (ok minimal;-) expensive radios or headsets lives were lost or unaccounted for during his watch as he is always on Patrol.

RESCUE OF THE YEAR: FEB 1ST AFTER HOURS MASS RESCUE

This award recognises the Bronte SLSC members that responded without hesitation to the "mass rescue - all assistance required" after hours call for backup from Club Captain James and his lifesaver wife Kirsty on the evening of Saturday 1st February 2020. The quick response, teamwork and skill shown during the late evening mass rescue was outstanding, and because of the team's actions, no lives were lost or further harmed. The Club members were assisted by the surfing community and SLS Duty Officer Matthew Evans, who coordinated Emergency Services and debriefings.

At the end of the event nine people were saved from possibly drowning with a further 2 assisted from the rocks. This included the treatment of a patient who was paddled in unconscious in difficult conditions and revived and stabilised on the beach by members before being assessed and transported by paramedics to hospital for advanced critical care.

COMPETITION TEAM OF THE YEAR: STATE SURFING TEAM



BOATIES REPORT

For the first time in memory Bronte decided to enter a crew in the George Bass Surf Boat Marathon.

The crew for the event included;

This was a huge fitness and logistics challenge. The event comprised racing over 7 days covering 190 kilometres between Batemans Bay and Eden on the NSW south coast in early January 2020. The age of our crew sat comfortably on the wrong side of 40, as a result we commenced training in January some 12 months prior to the event. Numerous erg, weights and boat sessions through winter and spring saw the crew arrive for the event well prepared. The marathon requires two crews to compete with crew changes every 10-20 minutes in open water as the craft progresses down the coast. A support boat driven by Jason Vineberg, Wamberal SC Boat Captain and local Fire Brigade Chief, ensured the guys in the support craft were well looked after. Crew changes happen in deep water and with 4 or 2 rowers exiting at a time, it's challenging and gets progressively harder the longer you are on the water.

Training included ocean passages from Yarra Bay to Wedding Cake Island and back. Conditions on occasions were testing, and on one adventurous outing we returned with a number of fish in the hull!

The team who travelled/camped with us included a supporter who played a key role helping to run operations like food & transport. Thanks, must go to the following friends and family for their assistance; Sandy and Brenda Stuart, Malcolm Forsyth, Shaun and Tracy Pike and Kerrie Brooks our masseuse. Thanks also to Darren "Mumbles" Morison who was always willing to help out with sweeping and boat driving during the preparation.

The crew finished a credible 6th in the open men's division when the event was cut short due to the bush fires.

In the second half of the season some of the George Bass crew went on to form a Masters/ Reserve Grade crew Titus Day, Dan Morris Jared Antony and Pete De szoeke along with Chris Pike. The guys competed successfully at the NSW State Titles winning gold in the 160 masters division and making the top 12 in the Reserve division.

During the season we attempted to get a girl's crew on the water with the help of Bastien Wallace unfortunately despite our best effort's numbers did not allow us to complete the full squad.

On the development front Darren Morrison has been training a new men's crew including; Alex Paterson, Ryan Stewart, Chris Champhin and Chris Anderson. These guys are training hard and hope to be seeing their first competition next season.



FINANCE MANAGER'S **REPORT**

It is with great pleasure that I submit the financial statements, company accounts and auditors report for the season 2019/20.

The past season was a challenging one with the world dealing with the Covid-19 Pandemic. The full economic impact didn't affect Bronte Surf Club's bottom line as much as it could have, with the club able to operate normally until March.

The overall result was a pleasing one, continuing our financial success with a positive result for the year of \$185,313.

This continues our years of previous strong results and places the Club in a very sound financial position. Some financial highlights appearing in this year's results are set out below.

INCOME

Total income was down slightly this season from \$1,365,704 to \$1,339,104.

Area's which were affected with the forced closure of the club in March were the Kiosk, with income down \$44,630 and the Bar sales, which were down \$64,661. It should be noted whilst Bar sales were down this year, it followed a very strong result

Donations are down \$34,223 following an increase the previous year of \$57,518

The main areas of increases were;

Following record receipts last year, this year's Bondi-Bronte Ocean Swim Fees were up again to \$13,503, another pleasing result.

Sale of Club Articles up \$26,685.

Grants increased \$22,433.

Subscriptions & Joining Fees are up by \$16,855, which is always a positive sign towards the overall well-being of the Club.

EXPENDITURE

Total Expenditure was up this season from \$1,129,715

Areas with increases in expenditure included,

Consultancy Fees for the Building Masterplan up by \$28,115

Training & Education expenses increased by \$9,448

Legal costs were up by \$54,334.

The main reductions in expenditure were Sponsorship Expenses, down \$12,195. (This was attributed to having purchased sponsors tents and water safety rashies the previous season)

Nipper Expenses were also down by \$13,382, as were Patrol Expenses by \$14,204

OVERALL POSITION

Members will see that once again we achieved a positive result and that Term Deposits have increased from \$1,704,110 to \$1,856,215 and Net Assets have increased from \$2,194,064 to \$2 379 377

Our members can remain satisfied that the Bronte Surf Life Saving Club is in a sound financial position. Members should note that the Board has been aware of the need to have surplus funds added to our accumulated funds for future club activities and the club's renovation that will take place over the next couple of years.

A special thanks to the Club's accountants, Kirk Maynard and Peter Kearns of Maynard Kearns, Club President Basil Scaffidi and General Manager Peter Butcher who have put in many hours with regards to the Club's compliance and the transparency of the Club accounts.

Finally, I would like to thank all our sponsors and donors for their continuing support of our great Club and you will find their names listed elsewhere in the Annual Report. I would also like to thank all the members who have contributed to our fundraising events and activities.

I commend the accounts to the members.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated is not a reporting entity because the Board of Management is of the opinion that there are unlikely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of financial reports tailored to satisfy all of their information needs. Therefore, this financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Board, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and Associations Incorporation Act NSW 2009 and the clubs constitution.

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board

The following accounting standards and significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous year unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 108 Accounting Polices, Changes in Accounting Estimates & Errors
- AASB 118 Revenue
- AASB 110: Events Occurring After Reporting Date
- AASB 116: Property, Plant and Equipment
- AASB 1031: Materiality

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

INVENTORIES

Inventories comprise goods for resale. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and are net of any rebates and discounts received.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

DEPRECIATION

The Depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

AMOUNTS OWED

Amounts owed are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less any allowance for uncollectable amounts.

An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the Association will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

AMOUNTS OWING

Amounts owing are carried at their invoiced cost and represent a liability for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Association becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services.

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Association and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specification criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

Sale of Goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Subscriptions

Revenue is recognised when a member is entitled to the benefits of belonging to the association.

Sponsorship, Donations & Grants

Unconditional sponsorship, donation & grant revenue is recognised in the income statements when it is controlled When there are conditions attached to the revenue relating to its use for specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided.

TAXES

Income Tax

No Income Tax is payable by Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated as Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 exempts Charitable Institutions from Income Tax.

Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax, except:

- (i) where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. It is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of the expense.
- (ii) receivables and payables are shown inclusive of GST.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and short-term deposits in the balance sheet comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less plus bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities under borrowings.

PROVISIONS

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.
















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
