





PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We are always proud as a Club to report that no lives have been lost on Bronte beach during the season just gone.

It was a season that commenced with celebrating the amazing job the Club has done over a number of years by being awarded the Sydney Branch and then the NSW Surf Lifesaving Club of the Year (being selected amongst over 120 other clubs). It was a great honour and recognition for all the hard work and dedication our volunteers have undertaken. Awards like these don't come around very often and they allow us a moment to reflect on the job that we do and how we do it. Thank you to everyone for your contribution. I believe the awards reflect the positive change in our culture; the inclusive nature of our club, the continued prioritisation of lifesaving and the growth of female leadership.

Thank you to all of our patrollers. This year we had 67 rescues and 10,582 preventive actions. We thank the Waverley Lifeguards for their continuous support, we value the great working relationship we have with them.

A major focus for the Board of Management has been the new building development and process. We lodged the DA in September with extensive community support. We have been liaising with the Eastern Planning Authority and the Design Excellence Architectural Panel. It is a complex planning process but we are working towards a DA resolution later this year.

The Club is in a strong financial position with a healthy surplus this year. We can meet our current obligations for a new building, when that arises. We are also working on future financials to support the club upon it being knocked down for a period of time.

Thank you to the many people who have contributed to our successful season. Firstly, to the Board of Management. Paul Wenck (Club Captain), Aaron O'Sullivan (Cadets), Anthony Burrows (Nippers), Betsy Rumble (Education) and Dave Finnimore (Communications and Sponsorship) who all intend to continue on the Board next year. Sadly, we will bid farewell to Kimberly Johns (Surf Sports) and Vanessa Power (Finance) who are both stepping down, fortunately for the Club they remain engaged in many aspects of the Club both professionally and on a voluntary basis. Thank you to Kylie Von Muenster, who was on the board for the initial period prior to contesting the seat of Coogee in the State election.

I acknowledge our very special administration team, who have all worked tirelessly led by General Manager Peter Butcher. Peter retired from full time General Manager in February but continues in a part-time finance role. Peter was our General Manager for over 10 years and we are appreciative of his dedication, hard work and performance. Great effort Pete.

Thank you to Kimberly Johns (Lifesaving & Education Coordinator and head of B2B) and now our General Manager. We are in good hands. We salute Gaby Naher, our Club Member of the Year. Betsy Rumble, recipient of the President's Award, and Ingrid Studholme for the Patron's Award. Congratulations to Neil Hayward, Rookie of the Year, Olivia Rosewall, our Lifesaver of the Year and Simon Banks as Patrol Captain of the Year.

We have many amazing patrollers and I would like to highlight the efforts of Jochen Valdeck, Anthony Burrows, Alastair Visch, Paul Watchman, Jason King, Tim Jeffries, Zoe Tindale, Jennifer Austin, Ben Nixon, Tara O'Reilly, Kimberly Johns, Paul Wenck, and Tim Brown who all recorded over 100 patrol hours. In all, the Club registered over 16,000 lifesaving hours (including water safety). Amazing! We have reviewed our records over the last 19 years and have identified 18 currently active members who have volunteer over 1,000 hours. An incredible contribution. Through the leadership of Betsy Rumble, our Education Team has done another great job this year with 61 SRC's (a club record), and 43 new Bronze, 9 Silver and 7 requalifying Gold Medallion holders. We also acknowledge Courtney Tallon as our Training Team Member of the Year.

It was another great Nippers year led by Anthony Burrows and Jessica Stewart and their hardworking committee. We have a great mix of girls and boys and the club appreciates all the assistance and guidance of our age managers. The Nippers remain for me the foundation of our future.

Thank you to the great efforts of our IRB team, wonderfully led by Jochen Valdeck and we congratulate Cam Miles and Paul Johnson as this year's IRB persons of the Year.

We acknowledge and thank our incredible group of sponsors, led by Macquarie Bank as our major partner of the Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim. This 'everyone's welcome' approach has translated to a growing team of masters representing Bronte at various carnivals throughout the year, including some great results at the SLSNSW State Nippers and Masters Championships. Our great surf boat history continues with our Reserve crew representing us at Aussies this year.

The Club is proud of our community programs including Dippers and the Swim for Ukraine initiated by Ingrid Studholme and Sally Bassett.

Sunday Joggers' has no bounds with lots of participants and we thank Geoff Doble, Ally Woodford and Morgan Green for their organisation. The Sunday Surf Race run by Life Member Barry Brignell has gone from strength to strength with more than 200 members taking part this season. Congratulations to Gaston Aidoud as this year's point score champion. Thank you to Jimmy Stewart for his help in managing the Club gymnasium.

Our social calendar was busy with events such as Derby Day, Back to Bronte Day and our End of Season Party, a sell-out where our members danced the night away. This year's Presentation Day was a real highlight and was a great way to finish the season. Our ANZAC Day Memorial Service also attracted a big crowd. It remains a pivotal day on the community calendar and most certainly a highlight for our Club.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT


What a busy year it's been! We started the season on a high, being awarded SLSNSW Club of the Year and we haven't paused since. After a raft of postponements over the past two seasons the Macquarie Bondi to Bronte Swim finally happened on a gloriously sunny Sunday on the first weekend in December. Despite a last minute relocation and change of course it was a resounding success. Christmas Day at Bronte saw crowds in excess of 15,000 converge on the park and water and thankfully there were no major incidents. A tireless effort by Patrol 6 to keep everyone safe on the day must be applauded.

In February 2023 I was asked to take on the role as Acting General Manager when Peter Butcher decided to hang up his boots. As an avid football supporter he won't mind me using that phrase - just don't ever refer to his sacred game as soccer! Peter had led the office team for just over ten years and in that time the organisation has grown and changed significantly.

With Peter's departure the Board of Management took the opportunity to pause, reflect, and review the structure of the whole



BRONTE NEW CLUBHOUSE UPDATE

CLUBHOUSE, COUNCIL AND COMMUNITY FACILITIES UPDATE

The Club and Waverley Council continue to progress with respect to a DA for a new community building. The DA was lodged at the end of July 2022. Since that time, it has been reviewed both by the Design Excellence Advisory Panel and the Sydney Eastern City Planning Panel.

In liaison with both these planning bodies, we lodged an amended design at the end of September, having expanded the contracted team to include a specialist planning consultant and an internationally acclaimed architectural firm, Warren and Mahoney (WAM). The process has been complicated due to a number of restrictions including our landform and topography. In addition, we need to work within the Bronte Plan of Management (governing guidelines) and the inability to build west (the pumphouse station) or south into the Bronte Park. The project takes into account not only the Club's needs, but those of the community, council requirements (importantly their council staff and lifeguards), and the desire to build a facility that meets our needs now and well into the future. The updated design responds to feedback from the approval authority and the Design Excellence Advisory Panel. This includes removing some of the top floor bulk, and incorporating Designing with Country principles to provide a better connection to the sandstone cliff, grass hill and promenade, increased accessibility around the clubhouse and honouring the heritage pump-station to the rear.

We are happy with the amended process and believe it gives us the best chance for an approved DA.

Thank you for everyone's continued support.

BRONTE UNIFIES: SURF EDUCATION FOR RECENTLY ARRIVED UKRAINIAN FAMILIES

Over the summer, Bronte Lifesavers welcomed recently displaced Ukrainian families to experience the joys and healing power of being at the beach, safely. Our first session in November '22 was so popular, we hosted another in January '23. The days began with a warm welcome, meeting the Lifeguards and Lifesavers to view the beach and what to look out for.

In the Clubhouse educators and volunteers guided the group through a surf education session answering questions about waves, rips and yes sharks. After lunch, Ukrainian parents alongside their children aged between four and sixteen joined volunteers on the sand. Fine conditions and low tide enabled us to enjoy magical moments together on paddle boards and immersing in the Bogey Hole. The joy on faces young and old illuminated the unifying nature of feeling safe and supported in the water. His Excellency Vasyl Myroshnychenko, Ambassador of Ukraine to Australia; Mayor Paula Masselos; Sam Cornell from SLSNSW and members of Tamarama SLSC joined us in January. After lunch the group burst into the Ukraine national anthem, a moment we will never forget.

Members of the Ukraine Council and Ukrainian community expressed words of gratitude:

...thank you to the most amazing team of volunteers for all the effort you put in to making Sunday such a huge success! The feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

...Beautiful, caring and kind people who made us all smile and cry a little yesterday. I will never forget this day.

...Thank you from the bottom of my heart and from our Ukrainian community for being so caring and for making everyone feel so welcome, loved and safe! We deeply appreciate your support!

We continue to build positive connections with the Ukraine community, hosting swim lessons at Icebergs and training swim coaches at UNSW Aquatic centre. Sixteen year old George, a rower in his homeland showed his skills supporting some of the youngest in the group to enter the water safely. Supported by our caring community, George has now become an accredited swim coach. We hope one day George may be patrolling our beaches. Stories have been shared on ABC News and Radio; we were Nominated for Community Education Program of the Year at the Sydney Branch Awards of Excellence; received a Community Life Commendation from Waverley Council and even a mention in Parliament. Well done to everyone involved. 

LIFESAVING REPORT

Following several challenging years characterised by unfavourable La Nina weather conditions and the COVID-19 pandemic, the 22/23 season brought a much-needed change. It felt like a return to normalcy, which was a positive development. The sun was mostly shining, and despite Bronte's notorious surf and rips, the conditions on the beach and in the water were relatively benign. Not always though. Our patrols faced some difficult situations at times. One notable example was Christmas Day when our patrols had to handle a wide range of incidents. Waverley Council estimated that around 15,000 to 20,000 beachgoers flocked to Bronte beach and the surrounding areas on that hot, sunny day. Our scheduled patrols, along with last-minute volunteers, including many cadets, carried out multiple rescues, located lost children and provided assistance to numerous injured individuals. Despite the potentially overwhelming nature of these circumstances, our team managed them with composure, good humour and enthusiasm. And, throughout the season, across all patrols, we witnessed numerous such instances of exceptional leadership and teamwork both on and off the beach. I am constantly amazed by the unwavering commitment and selflessness of our patrol members, who sacrifice their time and occasionally put their own lives at risk to protect the community So, I extend recognition and thanks to all patrollers, PCs, VC, IRB leadership, drivers and crew - you were and are simply first class. Your hard work and dedication are truly valued.

Thank you to the Education team, Cadet and Nipper members and parents. Supported by club volunteers, the Education team ran an efficient and fun skills maintenance programme across the whole season. Their tireless dedication and professionalism helped us onboard an excellent and talented cohort of newly certified Bronze Medallion holders, who join some of our longstanding members, many of whom have been patrolling since the early 1970s. The coordination of our Cadets and Nippers programmes with our life-saving operations continued to be successful and this season highlighted several opportunities to further enhance this cooperation, such as encouraging cadets and qualified Nipper parents to join all scheduled patrols when they can – it certainly made a big difference to beach safety over the Christmas and New Year's holiday period. Much of the heavy lifting preparing for the season comes down to Club Vice Captains Garry Luscombe and Paul Watchman and our roster masters, Jessica Soraya-Evans and Wil Schaffner. Collectively they dedicate an astonishing number of hours to ensure that our patrols are well-balanced with the required complement of qualified members. It is also important to recognise our gear stewards and working-bee elves who give up their time to ensure that we are operationally ready for the new season and that gear is in good order during operational months – thank you.

One of the privileges of the Club Captain role is that I have a view behind the curtain of how our club works. Our members are always well supported by the ever-present management team at the Board of Management and our lovely Bronte office crew. They are the wheels behind the (surf-operations) wheels. They are a team that truly has its finger on the pulse of our shared club experience. Their list of obligations and tasks are extensive: member welfare, operational performance, widening community participation and reputation, retention, recruitment, improving diversity, sifting the administrative crap and all the while sniffing the wind like bears for external menaces or sponsorship opportunities. They allow the whole parade to function at the march, and always in good order. Praise where praise is due and certainly worth recording.

Finally, I encourage all patrolling members to maintain a high level of proficiency and fitness over the winter months. It is a worthwhile investment to actively engage and encourage each other in preparation for the coming season. Make the most of the opportunities that the club has made in providing education and development courses and the invaluable access to quality equipment and skills training. Most of all, enjoy our crisp sunny winter days on our beautiful Bronte Beach. Dust down your wetsuits and embrace the clean, clear winter swells. 



EDUCATION REPORT

The Education team at Bronte welcomed the return of "normal" training conditions in the 2022/23 season. It was a relief to leave behind impossible challenges - like practising CPR while "social distancing" - and to be able to focus on important lifesaving skills across the full complement of awards throughout the season.

The 22/23 lifesaving season kicked off with a record 61 U14s successfully completing their Surf Rescue Certificate. This represented the culmination of a Herculean effort by trainer, Steve Tindale, with support from the wonderful Sophie Valdeck, and many years of support from their age managers and parents on water safety.

Within the Club we offered two full Bronze Medallion courses and one Cadet Bronze course, which added almost 70 members holding a Bronze Medallion to our Club ranks. All of our new Bronzies also completed their First Aid certificates through the Surf Lifesaving Academy to ensure that they are patrol ready and credentialled to take on higher awards.

A huge thank you goes out to the IRB Team who had a busy season training a new cohort of IRB Crew - with 13 members taking on the fun and the challenge of this award under the exceptional tutelage of Jochen Valdeck and Jason King.

In addition to the awards we deliver in-house, many of our dedicated members stepped up in the 2022/23 season, undertaking higher awards offered through Sydney Branch. We had 5 members receive their Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue and 9 members complete the newly minted Silver Medallion Patrol Captain award, with many more to follow in the offseason. These awards ensure the sustainability of our patrol and club leadership pipeline.

Spinals management upskilling was delivered on patrol this season to ensure that all members have been trained with the most up-todate content. This upskilling provided patrols with an occasion to refresh and practise their skills together. Moreover, it provided our teams with an opportunity to identify particular strengths in their members and to practise the communication and teamwork skills required in the event of a serious incident

Our Trainer of the Year for 2022/23 was the wonderful Courtney Tallon. Courtney was a great support in our skills maintenance offering this season as well as lending her considerable skills to the training of our spring Bronze course. Courtney was recognised for her ability to deliver training that leaves candidates feeling confident, well-informed and prepared to respond in the event of a real-life incident. Her calm demeanour, can-do attitude and practicality is appreciated by everyone who has the pleasure of learning from her. We are so grateful for her contribution this past season as well as for her contributions to Bronte's Education program over many years prior.

The Education program at Bronte relies on a wide swath of very dedicated members to flourish: trainers, assessors, mentors, and water safety. These members devote many unrecognised hours and days to preparing and delivering training and assessment. They are relied upon to show up without fail and to support our candidates unconditionally. We are so grateful for their commitment which also includes navigating the complex and time consuming requirements to ensure their own awards are kept current. We are incredibly lucky to have them.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who supported Education at Bronte this season and to our two wonderful administrators - Lizzy Liersch and Kimberly Johns who keep the whole organisation afloat. A huge thank you also to our Club Captain, Paul Wenck who has been an Education champion this year and to Gaby Naher and Steve Brown who oversaw safety for our annual Skills Maintenance program.

It is an honour to serve as the Director of Education of such a wonderful club. I look forward to seeing everyone back on the beach in 2023/24.



To say we were back in the swing of things during the 2022/2023 season is an understatement with a massive 703 nippers receiving their surf education award this season at Bronte. This is no mean feat given this is the second largest number in the Sydney Branch on a relatively small patch of Sydney's beautiful coastline. Free of COVID restrictions and blessed with plenty of great conditions on Sundays, it was pleasing to see everyone making the most of what has been a fantastic Nipper season at Bronte.

This season we chose to focus on a number of key objectives which included, as always, safety of our kids and volunteers in the water, fostering a culture of surf craft care, spreading the load amongst our hardworking volunteer network and 'Taking 3 for the Sea' any time we visit a beach. It was impressive to see the age managers take on these focus areas with gusto to support the development of our junior lifesavers in training.

What really stood out for us this season was each age group maximising all available training opportunities. We had the younger groups using the pool, bogey hole, sand and park, having fun and gaining their confidence in the coastal environment. On behalf of the Bronte Nippers community, I would like to express my thanks and appreciation to the Nipper Committee and in particular Jess Stewart who worked tirelessly to deliver and support an amazing program for our children. I would also like to highlight the significant contributions made by our coaches: Ben Nixon, Al Visch, Jo Mermaid, Will Brown, Jackson Raymond, Jack Williams and Amy and Zac Sharma. Steve Brown, with his expanding crew of board repairers, has again done a great job to keep our foam and fiberglass boards watertight and paddle-ready for each session. DIPPERS REPORT

In February and March, our Club ran our second 'Dippers' program in conjunction with Autism Swim. This is an 8-week modified Nipper program for neurodiverse kids and is free for all participants. Dippers was developed by Autism Swim to provide water safety education to children with Autism Spectrum Disorder who, alarmingly, are 160 times more likely to drown than those without.

Our second Dippers season built on all we worked on in our first year, but with weather and conditions that made it a delight to be at the beach, no matter what sort of delightful chaos was erupting! The children – most of whom had participated the previous season – learned tube rescues, paddled 'Redbacks' in the Bogey Hole and learned the fundamentals of paddling 'patients' (or of being patients themselves) on foam rescue boards. They also started to find their balance above water in the Bronte pool atop the hugely popular new 'lily pad'...along with plenty of local children alike.

This program gives both to the participant children and to the volunteers from Bronte SLSC. It is, afterall, a privilege to learn the language of those who see and experience the world differently. It's challenging and exciting to learn new ways to communicate well with the children in the programme and to help them understand the beach environment that we all hold so dear. What's more, it brings us a very particular sort of joy to help these children catch a wave on a board, swim from one side of Bronte pool to another, or learn to stand balanced atop of the water.

We were delighted to welcome Arina and her mother, Olesia (recent arrivals from Ukraine), to this second Dippers season. Arina brought her curiosity and willingness to connect with new children to this surf education experience. She especially loved the lily pad and the tug of war! Every week Arina ran onto the beach, excited to be with her newfound Dippers friends and her volunteers, Bri and Rosie. Arina's tenacity and positivity were inspiring and her mother thanked the Bronte volunteers for 'these wonderful, incredibly fun moments for us and our children.'

The 2022 volunteers welcomed some new blood by way of cadets, Sophia and Molly, and Zoe from Tamarama SLSC. We were so proud that 'our' Sophia Willis was nominated in the Sydney Branch Awards of Excellence as 'Youth Volunteer of the Year'.

We can't wait for our third season, and hope to see some fresh volunteers join us in 2024.

CADETS REPORT

It gives me great pleasure to present the Cadets Report for the 2022/23 season at Bronte Surf Club. This season has been one of growth and achievement, with a record number of Cadets and SRC graduates. I am pleased to share the key highlights and accomplishments of our dedicated Cadets.

Key Highlights:

- This season saw the highest number of Cadets ever at Bronte Surf Club. With 165 enthusiastic participants, our Cadets program has continued to attract and retain young adults who are eager to contribute to our community and develop their surf lifesaving skills.

- 4. Patrol Excellence and Lifesaving Contributions: Our Cadets have been an invaluable asset to our patrolling efforts, with five patrols operating in rotation on Sunday mornings. They have actively participated in on-water rescues and provided crucial assistance on-shore. Moreover, our Cadets have played a vital role in maintaining water safety for Nippers, ensuring a secure environment for our younger members to participate in beach activities.
- 5. Community Engagement and Volunteerism: Our Cadets have gone above and beyond their responsibilities, engaging

in various community events and initiatives. They made a significant contribution to the Bondi to Bronte Swim, with Cadets making up almost half of the volunteers on the day. Additionally, during public holidays, including Christmas Day, where the beach and park welcomed over 25,000 visitors, the Cadets provided their time and efforts to ensure everyone's safety.

SURF SPORTS REPORT

2022/23 the season of getting back to 'normal'. For the first time in years, group training was back in full swing and our members made the most of it. Our Tuesday Board Skills sessions, again under the expert eye of Anthony Burrows, continued its great momentum. Even in winter these sessions have had minimum numbers of 15-20, often doubling when sunrise allowed for a 6am start. Many mornings saw the board racks largely left bare. Despite running for many years, it remains a welcoming place for new paddlers, as shown by the excellent patronage of our most recent Bronzies. This program continues to be instrumental in building member skills and cross club connections.

Speaking of connections, our Sunday 'Social' Paddle was reintroduced by superstar Amber Brown with numbers steadily increasing throughout summer. A special thanks to Amber and Paul Watchman for making these sessions happen whenever conditions allowed. It was great to see so many turning up and then sharing a (tall) story or two at Sunday Sips afterwards.

Garry Luscombe continued his infamous "6AM with Garry" swim sessions at North Bondi on Wednesday mornings. These sessions continue to go from strength to strength with swimmers showing up every week to brave the early mornings and either swim across the bay or test their skills in and out of the surf zone.

The Sunday Surf Race returned for the third season since its relaunch. Skilled waterman, Barry Brignell, was again at the helm allocating and adjusting participant handicaps to keep the races even and this resulted in many close finishes. Despite a weighty handicap there was one competitor who shone: huge congratulations to this season's run-away winner, 16 year old Gaston Aidoud. An incredible result, given he often rolled out of bed mere minutes before the 11am start of the race. Congratulations also to Anthony Burrows and Jenny Austin for placing second and third respectively.

The Monday morning 'Softies' (soft sand runners) took a break in the off season and resumed in September 2022. The group is reasonably small but committed and Maca has built great camaraderie. It was great to see many of the Softies participating in the City to Surf in August as a team.

After the disappointment of last season, Masters competition returned with a vengeance. The first team carnival of the season - the Freshie Masters, is our favourite. We took a large team, including some enthusiastic first timers. The conditions were by far the most challenging we have encountered at Freshie, with large sets creating carnage on the back bank. Having honed our skills at Bronte, we were up to the task and for the third year in a row, took 3rd place overall!

Sydney Branch Championships saw some outstanding individual results, a swag of medals but most importantly, an awesome display of team spirit. It was fantastic to see Amber Brown defend her gold medal in the board race, despite the two year hiatus. Other golds included the men's ski relay, the women's board rescue (Kimberly Johns and Kate Stewart) and the men's 2km beach run (Tim Jeffries). Georgie Ryan won a bronze in the Open Champion Lifesaver competition, the 'decathlon' of surf lifesaving that tests a wide range of knowledge and physical skills. It was great to see Charlie Bonne-O'Gorman represent Bronte in the U15s - we hope to encourage some teammates to compete with her next season.

Bronte is known for its great board riders and we certainly have some impressive young talent coming through the ranks. We had a strong contingent of cadets at the Sydney Branch carnival with Poppy O'Reilly taking home gold. Joe Hatton and Poppy also competed at the SLSNSW State Board Riding Championships. Both made the finals with Poppy securing gold! A huge thank you to Adam Morison who stepped up to the role of Surf Board Riding Manager, had a crash course in carnival eligibility rules and really rallied the troops.

We took our largest Masters team in recent memory to the SLSNSW State Championships at Queenscliff. The team of 10 performed admirably against some of the best. Bronte brought their renowned



team spirit and walked away with some PB's, invaluable experience, outstanding results and a few medals for good measure. Highlights include:

- Kate Stewart with a silver in both the swim and board despite almost no board training in recent years. Those Stewarts are a special breed.
- Trish Ford won a Bronze medal in flags, at the upper end of her age group no less.
- Tim Nixon with an exceptional 6th in the Tube race, despite never having seen the event before.
- Kate Stewart and Kimberly Johns winning GOLD in the board rescue, truly living up to the Bronte SLSC motto of Train Hard, Rescue Easy! It was absolutely the perfect way to cap off the carnival for the team.

We look forward to taking along a strong team again next year!

Our Surf Boats team continues to do us proud. The famed Bronte Beserkers shifted their focus this season from competing to supporting our Reserve Grade crew, the Bronte Benders, through coaching and training. This support paid dividends with the Benders crowned runners-up at Sydney Branch and after making the long trip over to Perth for Aussies, making the qualifying finals. Speaking of Aussies, Trish Ford proved that age is just a number and cleaned up again this year. Trish came home with a silver in beach sprint and a bronze in both the 1km run and beach flags. Word is, Trish will have a good number of teammates under the Bronte tent in 2024 when the Aussies are held in Queensland.

The season ended on a highly positive note, with the 'End-of-Season' club carnival a roaring success despite being rescheduled twice. A combination of team and individual championship races were contested in cool, overcast conditions, coupled with a tricky sandbank. We saw fierce competition all day, none more so than the women's board race. Whilst our Bronte ladies appear super friendly on the outside, inside lurks a fiercely competitive spirit that sees them race harder than anyone. It was a closely fought race until a huge wave hit them as they approached the sandbank, obliterating the field. BONDITO BRONTE REPORT

The running of the 21st Macquarie Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim wasn't without its challenges, and our volunteers rose to resolve every single one of them. A heartfelt thank you to our naming rights sponsor, Macquarie Bank, which has shown unwavering support for the event for nine years now. To Carly Smith in particular, whom I thoroughly enjoy working with, you are an all-round superstar! Thank you also to our wonderful event partners: Banana Boat, ENGINE and World Series Swims. Finally, thank you to all the generous swimmers who donated essential funds to our event charity partner, The Kids' Cancer Project.

Although we hadn't run the event for 3 years, it didn't deter us from trying a few new things. We had our first ever event intern, the absolutely amazing Lauryne Urtizberea. Lauryne joined us from France for 4 months to learn the ins and outs of running an ocean swim. She was definitely treated to a sink or swim induction and well and truly rose to the challenge. As well as being an eternally positive presence in the office, there was nothing Lauryne couldn't do, or learn quickly and in the end I'm certain we learned more from her than she did from us. We miss her!

We also introduced a new course to the event: a 5km circuit that took swimmers off the beach at Bondi, north to Ben Buckler, a 180 degree turn to head south to the Bronte reef and back to Ben Buckler before returning to the sand. We offered 100 places for the inaugural swim and they were snapped up fast.

No matter how much we prepare for the day, we can't control the ocean and the surf was up on Saturday afternoon and predicted to grow. The safety of all participants and water safety is always our top priority and after several conditions assessments by our Event Safety Committee and Waverley Council Lifeguards, we made the difficult decision to adjust the courses for the Bondi to Bronte (B2B) and Junior Ocean Swims (JOS). The 5km remained unchanged.

The logistics of physically moving the event and communicating that change to all volunteers and participants was enormous. Our volunteers responded without question, turned up at Bondi Beach the next day without a grumble, and jumped in where needed to make things happen - all with a smile. The massive relocation effort went late into the night and a big shout out to Lauryne, Lachy Gepp and Tim Jeffries for staying with me to the bitter end!

Despite all the challenges, the day was a resounding success. Over 2,000 swimmers took part in the three course options. Our youngest participant was 9 and our oldest was 89. Congratulations to everyone who had a go. RESCUE OF THE YEAR LUIS SANTELIZ

Luis was surfing at Bronte early one evening and heard someone calling for help. Two teenage swimmers, a male and a female, were caught in the centre of the beach in the break zone, approx. 200m from shore. They looked distressed and tired and the surf was 4-5 ft with an occasional 7-footer. The Waverley Council Lifeguards had left for the day.

Luis leapt into action and with the assistance of two young surfers, helped the distressed swimmers return to shore. Assessing the situation, he decided to focus his attention on the swimmer who appeared more distressed and less experienced. With the assistance of the surfers, Luis placed the swimmers on the surfboards. They were then towed back to shore by Luis and his helpers swimming the boards in, the task made that much harder by the rip in the centre of the beach and big sets continuing to roll it. Thankfully, the assisting surfers were competent swimmers but Luis constantly checked they were ok to ensure it was safe enough for them to continue assisting. They took it slowly to ensure they got the swimmers back to the beach and kept them as calm as possible.

One swimmer was short of breath, tired and in shock for a few minutes, having gone in to assist his friend, he had gotten into trouble himself. Both swimmers slowly recovered and did not appear to require further medical assistance. Despite this, Luis recommended they monitor each other and seek medical help if they started to feel ill.

The two swimmers and their friends were extremely grateful Luis was there in their time of need. Well done Luis - you are a true asset to Bronte SLSC!



PATROL TEAM OF THE YEAR PATROL 11

One of the most enjoyable aspects of the Club Captain role is the opportunity to drop-in and be part of each Patrol. And while it was challenging to pick a Patrol of the Year this season, one patrol stood out. Patrol 11 have consistently delivered high standards of teamwork and lifesaving skills. A big Thank You to Johno and Cam for their long time IRB and Club support.


PATROL CAPTAIN OF THE YEAR SIMON BANKS

'It's like clockwork until it isn't'... Simon Banks, Patrol Captain of Patrol 15, reflected recently. Simon was referring to the reality that even the most thorough patrol preparation and planning may not be enough when confronted with unforeseen and complex incidents. The most effective leaders and teams are those that are able to operate with calm purpose and confidence when unexpected challenges are presented to them.

One set of challenging circumstances stands-out as an example of this. On New Year's Day 2023, thousands of beachgoers descended on Bronte. The surf conditions were challenging - especially the Bronte shore break. Simon and his team were confronted with several serious medical incidents : a suspected spinal, a suspected fractured leg, a swimmer in need of rescue and a lost child - all presenting themselves within minutes of each other. Despite the pressure of multiple medical scenarios, Simon was able to quickly delegate team members to manage each incident while roping in additional resources, including the Lifeguards, the Duty Officer and Bronte SLC cadets. Throughout it all, Simon remained at the centre of the beach, calmly delegating to his VC and patrol team and supporting resources. Simon ensured that each incident was being managed to the best outcome. and it was highly impressive.

Simon's dedication and commitment to running a highly effective team while prioritising team and public safety is exceptional. His professional conduct has been evident in his ability to handle difficult situations, including sensitive personal well-being issues with members of his team - both on and off the beach. His leadership has inspired his team members to think and act differently. He has constantly stressed the need to assess a situation before acting and for team members to communicate clearly and put their hand up if a situation leaves them out of their comfort zone. His positive team culture, which in turn has meant that Patrol 15 is a cohesive and highly effective team.

Over the whole season, Simon has been an outstanding Patrol Captain and his selection as Patrol Captain of the Year is welldeserved.







VISCH FAMILY ROOKIE OF THE YEAR NEIL HAYWARD

Not a Nippers task goes by without Neil volunteering to assist! Since joining, the Club has benefited enormously from Neil's capable, unrufflable 'can do' approach and this season, he has taken it up another notch. FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the audited financial report for Bronte Surf Lifesaving Club ("the Club") for the year ended 30 April 2023. The Club's results continued to improve upon those of the prior year. This was the first financial year since the start of COVID-19 that the club operated as business as usual for the full year.Pleasingly the Bondi to Bronte swim was able to run back on the beach this year and was a great success raising significant funds that support the club's lifesaving activities.

FINANCIAL RESULT

The Club reported a surplus of \$247,145 for the year ended 30 April 2023. This is a welcome increase on last year's reported surplus of \$52,112. The key revenue and expense factors that contributed to this increase in surplus are discussed below.

Club revenues improved by 82% from the prior year, after excluding the effect of prior year specific COVID-19 government stimulus and assistance payments. Key drivers of this improvement in revenue are explained below.

- Bar sales and room hire income returned to and improved upon pre COVID-19 levels. The Club experienced a surge in room hire bookings and enquiries with previously cancelled and deferred events able to be held without restriction.
- Sponsorship income increased from the prior year due to the recognition of Bondi to Bronte event sponsorship which had been deferred in the prior year. Our sponsorship was further bolstered this year by the addition of two new sponsors.
- Subscription & joining fees increased slightly from the prior year following some modest price increases whilst the membership base remained stable.
- The Bondi to Bronte swim was run successfully in December 2023 having been deferred from March 2023 in the prior financial year. A strong participation rate resulted in high event fee revenue.
- Kiosk income and proceeds from the Sunday BBQ both improved from the prior year predominantly due to better

weather conditions. The prior two years were adversely affected by significant rainfall over the summer season which resulted in lower trading volumes.

Grant income includes the first tranche of federal government funding for the new clubhouse. As per the heads of agreement with Waverley council, this funding was contributed by the Club as a progress payment towards the project (see expense item, Council building fees). This results in a net nil impact on the reported surplus.

Expenditure has increased in line with the improvement in associated revenues with the exception of employment expenses. Employment expenses were abnormally high in the year ended 30 April 2023. This was largely due to employee turnover leading to the recognition of significant accrued employee entitlement balances. In addition to this were some general remuneration increases in line with inflation as well as a further increase in the superannuation guarantee rate.

FINANCIAL POSITION

This year's surplus result has enabled the Club to strengthen its reserves to \$2.60 million. Cash reserves as at 30 April 2022 are \$2.0 million. Consequently, the Club remains in a strong financial position.

The Club will continue to maintain prudent reserves to fund future club activities, particularly the Club's renovation plans and any unforeseen circumstances.

The Club would like to thank its sponsors and donors for their continued support throughout this year. As always, it is only with their generous support that the Club is able continue to provide important lifesaving services to our community and to develop our future surf lifesavers through the delivery of our nipper programme.

I commend the accounts to the members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements cover Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a notfor-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 ('the Act').

1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Board of Management have determined that Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the "Association") is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the Board members, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Association's Board members, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991, the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012, the Associations Incorporation Act NSW 2009 and the Association's constitution.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies described below and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1048 Interpretation of Standards and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

Other than those accounting policies and disclosure standards referred to above, no assessment has been made as to whether the financial statements comply with all Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Income tax

No income tax is payable by the Association as section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 exempts charitable institutions from income tax.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

 incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows

Revenue and other income

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred.

Generally, the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of finds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

Subscriptions

Membership subscription income is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered and corresponds to the satisfaction of performance obligations and transfer of control to the customer.

Amounts received in advance are recognised as deferred income and credited to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the expected subscription period.

Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset.

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligation is satisfied.

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of the benefit.

Inventories

Inventories comprise goods for resale. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the Association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from the asset or CGU.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or a period deemed appropriate for the needs of the Association.

Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities under borrowings.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are recognised at original invoice amount less any allowance for uncollectable amounts. An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the Association will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are carried at their invoiced cost and represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of the recognition of the liability.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable than an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

Determining the fair value of property, plant and equipment requires estimation, at the reporting date, of the effects of uncertain future events. Outcomes within the next financial year that are different from the assumptions made could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment.

The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Board of Management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the Association to express an opinion on the financial report.

We communicate with the Board of Management regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.


