PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We as a Club never take for granted being able to report that no lives have been lost on Bronte Beach during the season just gone.

It was a season that still gave us COVID-19 challenges and difficult beach conditions, but we successfully managed throughout the season and I would like to thank everyone for the part they played. And the absolute highlight was being awarded the Sydney Branch Club of the Year. A wonderful recognition of our Club's hard work and culture.

Lifesaving is the core of our Club and we have continued to be diligent in upskilling our lifesavers and education capabilities. It is the highest of our priorities and the Club is proud of our strong lifesaving base. We are equally proud of the growth of female leadership in our Club.

Thank you to all of our volunteers and we also appreciate the continuous support of the Waverley Council lifeguards. This year we had 124 rescues and 4916 preventive actions, again showing a very pro-active attitude by our lifesavers.

A focus for the Board of Management has been the new building development and process. As members know, we instigated a new design which was greatly accepted by the members and very importantly by the community and was then adopted by Waverley Council. The design is currently being finalised with an aim for the DA to be lodged in September this year.

Despite the COVID challenges and not holding the annual Macquarie Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim, we are still in a strong financial position and can meet our current obligations for a new building. We are also working on future financials upon club being knocked down for a period of time.

In all, the club registered over 12,873 lifesaving (including water safety) hours. Amazing!

Our Education Team under the expert guidance of Betsy Rumble have excelled this year with 35 SRC's, highlighted by the graduation of Liam Skeete, and 44 new Bronze, 8 Silver and 7 requalifying Gold Medallion holders. We also acknowledge Paul Watchman as our Training Officer of the Year.

It was another great Nippers year led by Anthony Burrows and Jessica Stewart and their hardworking committee. There is a real calmness about how we run our Nipper program on Sundays and that is a credit to Ant and his team (as opposed



to when I was running Nippers, when it was truly organised chaos!)

'DNEY BRANCH SEASON 21/22

We are incredibly proud of our members and we thank each and every one who makes our Club the inclusive and progressive place that it is, dedicated to saving lives on Bronte Beach and beyond. Five years ago, the Club's Board of Management set a strategic plan with specific targets for each area of the Club and committed to implement it. The award recognises the efforts of not only our Club leadership, but every single member who has supported this vision and contributed along the way.

We are proud to protect the public, patrolling one of NSW's most challenging beaches, and offer ourselves as a welcoming, inclusive and community-minded club. Everyone is welcome at Bronte. Many members link their involvement at Bronte with a positive mental health benefit- something that has become ever more important over the last couple of years.

Our primary mission is our lifesaving capability. We live by the motto "train hard, rescue easy". This is exemplified by our dedication to upskilling members, through training/ skills sessions targeted at all ability and confidence levels. We have continued to boost patrol team numbers and enhance member skills through new awards despite COVID disruptions. We have built a Masters competition team focusing on participation rather than results to enhance our members' skills and confidence in the surf which can be applied back on patrol.

Our Nippers program is strong and despite a few challenging seasons of bad weather, rough seas and public health considerations, our volunteer and participant numbers continue to be extraordinary. Our continued focus on welcoming the whole family, providing an experience for all

skill levels on Sundays, offering extra training for all those who seek it and keeping fun at the heart of everything we do is a testament to the spirit and strength of everyone involved.

We actively seek out opportunities to include and support members of the wider community. In the 21/22 season, we established a successful Dippers program and we led the charge for the second year running on the Rainbow Beaches celebration which brings the spirit of Mardi Gras to the beach.

Our leadership team, supported by an outstanding administrative team, role-models positive behaviours and actions and balances continuity with rotation of key roles to allow long-term operational efficiency, whilst encouraging new perspectives. In 2021/22, female leaders on the Board of Management tipped over the 50% mark with 5 of 8 positions filled by women. Similarly, the gender balance in our patrol leadership is reflective of our membership. We have found that enhancing our female leadership has contributed to an improved club culture.

We aim to be sustainable in all our endeavours. We are financially sustainable and enjoy a stable membership base reflecting a mix of longstanding and new members. The development of robust pathways and strong mentorship has increased our retention of junior members significantly. We have a newly established Environmental Sustainability Committee to identify how we can enhance our operations and our patrollers are encouraged to clear debris and rubbish from our shores during quiet periods.

Our success as a Club has come about through sustained focus, commitment and hard work, coupled with a lot of fun! We will not rest on laurels; instead we will strive for continuous improvement and we can only do so with the ongoing support and contribution of our fabulous members and the wider community.

BRONTE NEW BUILDING UPDATE

The Club is pleased with the significant progress that has been made on our potential new Club building over the last 6 – 9 months. In March, Waverley Council endorsed our new building design and we are now proceeding to Development Application documentation. A new Heads of Agreement was executed between the Club and Waverley Council with Phil Leamon and Arcanary being appointed by Council as head consultants.

The Club is continuing to discuss and incorporate member, community and stakeholder views during the detailed design phase of the project. Our current timeline has us lodging a DA towards the end of September this year.

The role the Club undertakes in lifesaving and taking care of the public has never been more relevant, nor our association and interaction with the community. We have a unique opportunity to participate in the history of both Bronte and Bronte Surf Life Saving Club, by creating a building that will serve the community now and for generations to come.

CAPTAINS LOG 2021-22

As your Captain and fellow Patrolling Lifesaver, I can honestly say this has been a tough season for the membership and the Clubs leadership team. Kicking off the season was done so with general uncertainty and concern for our members welfare and appetite to Patrol. In particular, managing how our Club members could conduct effective Life Saving Operations in a sustained effective manner despite working to a reduced Patrol size mandate from SLSNSW.

At the time our communities were also dealing with the ever evolving local area lockdown travel and movement restrictions. Organisations were having to review, adopt and make decisions on implementing and enforcing vaccination policies. For Surfclubs this was scary new ground that had the potential to polarise, split and disenfranchise the membership

Adding to this were further changes in how we studied, worked, travelled, exercised and generally interacted with each other which placed obvious stress on the members and their family. A real concern of member retention and engagement, particularly for Patrolling Operations, existed around August and September 2021. The considered effort put in by the Patrols to reorganise themselves to ensure their mates who hadn't been able to get to the beach due to LGA restrictions was commendable.

The regular catch ups as individual teams on group Zoom calls and WhatsApp chats was infectious (pun intended). Equally, the unique ways of keeping fit and accidently meeting out the back of the break or where LGAs may possibly meet to share a covert wave, swim and a laugh was inspiring.

As a club we truly executed on the art of possible this season. Our members truly leaned in to uncertainty by attending Floods and after-hours Search andRescue callouts without warning or hesitation. Our members initiated community education programmes such as Dippers and fought courageously to choose our own direction with regards to how our ClubHouse should be reimagined and integrated into our community.

I've always subscribed to the motto "you don't rise to the occasion you fall to your last level of training" and the resilience shown by our membership to endure and to do the right thing underpins our "Train Hard - Rescue Easy" motto. It's these efforts in Part which I can proudly say resulted in Bronte Surf Club winning Club of the year last month at the Sydney Branch Annual Awards Of Excellence.

Patrol teams became stronger with excellent collaborative leadership shown by the existing and next gen PC's and multiple VC's per Patrol. PATROL 3

I love Saturday morning patrols on Bronte Beach. The beach is clean and clear for us to set up. After a quick chat with the lifeguards covering tide times, wave height, rip locations, recent major rescues, weather forecast for the day, the amount of beach erosion in the last storm, how many beach visitors brought their pet goat during the last week, current major sporting events, and the expected result of the next election, we have free reign to determine the optimal location to place the gear that has been so competently checked and made ready by our enthusiastic and diligent gear steward. Of course one important topic covered with the lifeguards is the location to erect the patrol tent. We carefully choose a place that will provide keen-eyed patrollers within the tent a clear view of important activity in the water, while not obstructing sight lines from the lifeguards' window to the mixing bowl or any key part of the water line. We work together.

One topic never discussed is the quality of the work done in erecting the patrol tent. This is without doubt the most regimented part of the day for patrol 3. No other patrol does it like us and no patrol does it better. Once a site is properly surveyed, the responsible patrollers transport the folded shelter from its storage location to the site. Once on location, the two halves of each arch are united with skill and precision reminiscent of the joining of the two halves of the harbour crossing for which Sydney is so famous. With a patroller on each rope we hoist the structure into place and make any final adjustments to placement. Then the digging begins. Each rope is secured by a peg that must be placed at an appropriate angle and distance from the tent. Once the trenches have been properly prepared, the patrol captain

wields the mallet to ensure that the pegs are well anchored into wet sand. Others then backfill the trenches to eliminate otherwise potential ankle-mangling hazards. Each guy rope is then tensioned, with a small tune played as a final test. The final step in the patrol tent set up process is to beat the living daylights out of the fabric with a couple of rescue tubes in order to liberate any sand that may have been elevated with the tent. Now the tent is ready for use and can be filled with the required oxy, defib, first aid kit and other gear on tables surrounded by the patrol box, along with the all-important chairs.

No weather event has ever been able to disturb a tent set up by patrol 3. We are undisputed experts in patrol tent erection. The tent manufacturer has visited us every season to marvel at our extraordinary skill. In the patrol 3 photo this year you can see him participating in a patrol physical-distancing exercise during the first patrol of the season. Unable to wait until next season for his next dose of excellence, he dropped in again to our last patrol of the season

Having completed the all-important tent erection, along with the rest of the beach set-up, we find it is time to collect the coffee orders. I love Saturday morning patrols on Bronte Beach.

Patrol Fifteen's season began with high drama. It was a cool spring afternoon. The sun was out and the surf was up — way up. The Tasman Sea was bowling a big messy swell from the South East and the thunderous waves were closing out over a newly formed sandbank some 200m off the beach. The churning water then washed wide and broken towards the beach, before reforming into a powerful and steep shore break. Despite the wild sea, the Sunday afternoon beach crowd was building. Sydney was emerging from Covid lockdown. What better antidote to lockdown blues than a trip to beautiful Bronte Reach?

At our briefing our Patrol Captain, Cathal Murphy, emphasised that the outgoing tide and rough conditions would require extra vigilance across the whole beach. He was not wrong. We had just deployed the patrol when our roving team, Cameron Martlew and Phil Grantham, raised the alarm. At the north end of the beach, two young boys had been swept off their feet and were being dragged out into a very messy area of deep water and swirling wash. A rescue board was deployed and with some difficulty, reached the two boys who were now some 50 metres from shore. Returning to the beach with both boys on the board was not an option. But, by clinging to either side of the rescue board, the exhausted swimmers were at least buoyant. All were now at the mercy of the swell which was pushing the trio towards the rocks between Bronte and Tamma. Fortunately, one of the lifeguards arrived to help in the nick of time, which allowed for one of the boys to be transferred onto his rescue board. We were back in business. Both the lifequard, our board paddler and their two passengers, began to paddle hard out to sea to avoid the rocks. It was an exhausting struggle of popping

over the broken waves and then paddling hard to gain further distance from the cliffs. Eventually both boards clawed back enough water to try and head for shore. And, as smart as a Grenadier on the parade square, they executed an about-face to catch a wave that barrelled them towards the beach. It was a bumpy old ride and both boards came a cropper at the shore-break. Fortunately, the strong hands of Fred Heida, Cameron and Phil were on hand to drag everyone out of the water and to the safety of the soft sand. The team had also rescued the boys' father who had entered the water to try and rescue his sons. The brothers, one 9 and the other 11 years old had had quite a fright, but were otherwise unscathed.

The remainder of the season was, by comparison, relatively quiet. We did have a few scares with members of the public falling victim to the shore break and there was plenty of minor first aid to keep us occupied. A big call out to Jess Soraya, Brian O'Dea, Matt Brown, Simon Banks, Dane Rosen, Max Wenck and Hamish Carlise for their roles in treating patients both at the shore break and in and around the patrol room where they dealt with some fairly awful blue bottle stings. Our IRB team of Dave Fleeting, Andrew Valder and Grant Lovett were ever reliable and were also involved in 'outside the flags' operations during the floods. The season ended on a thrilling high with the birth of the beautiful young girl who is Ailbhe (pronounced Alva) O'Dea. Congratulations to the proud O'Dea Parents.







EDUCATION REPORT

It was with some trepidation that I took over the role of Chief Training Officer from Sam Stone at the beginning of the 2021/22 season. Although living up to the exceptional example set by Sam remains an elusive goal, when I got down to work my nerves were settled. Sam left Bronte's education program in a very strong position, making it easy to take the reins. Thank you, Sam!

Like everything else, COVID presented considerable challenges to the education program in the 2021/22 season. Sydney's lockdown prevented mid-year courses and general uncertainty and the late start to the season contributed to a scaled-back education program when compared with non-COVID impacted seasons. Despite the reduced course offerings, Bronte still received awards across the range offered through the club and Branch: Surf Rescue Certificate, Bronze Medallion, First Aid, Advanced Resuscitation Techniques, Silver Medallion (Aquatic Rescue and Beach Management), Trainer's Certificate, and IRB Crew.

Ever-changing awards requirements ensure we continue to explore new ways to deliver courses. Starting this season, first aid and resuscitation specific awards delivered by the Surf Lifesaving Academy were required to advance to ARTC and to train/assess ARTC, SRC and Bronze Medallion courses. This required "upskilling" of the education team and prospective ARTC candidates. It also led to the incorporation of an externally delivered First Aid training into our February Bronze Medallion course to ensure our newest lifesavers start their careers with the award prerequisites for advanced courses. We look forward to refining the delivery of this offering in the coming seasons.

Bronte's Education Team is comprised of trainers, assessors, facilitators and water safety who generously offer their time and skills to ensure the sustainability of the club. They are directly responsible for producing the next generation of life savers: our cadets, our patrollers, and our water safety.

This season, the Education team added 1 facilitator, 1 assessor, 4 probationary trainers and 2 full fledged trainers to its ranks to ensure our own viability in seasons to come. Our SRC/Bronze courses were led by two of our most consistent and dedicated trainers: Steve Tindale and Paul Watchman. The efforts of both Steve and Paul were recognised in the end of season awards. Paul was recognised as the Trainer of the Year for his on-going commitment to the Bronze Medallion program and his outstanding efforts to ensure his candidates were well prepared for assessment and the patrols that follow despite prolonged poor surf and water conditions afflicting

their course. Steve was recognised with the Patron's Award which took into account his unparalleled dedication to training our U14s through the Surf Rescue Certificate and our senior Cadets through their Bronze Medallion in addition to his contribution to the Cadet program on a weekly basis throughout the season.

An absolute highlight of the season was the completion of the SRC by this year's U14s in a course led by Steve Tindale with support from Jenny Austin. The under 14s, their age managers and water safety, along with our education team were the pride of the club working together to support Liam Skeete, our first neurodiverse SRC candidate to successfully complete the course. Liam and his family have blazed a trail in the education program that will open this path for others to follow.

It would be remiss of me not to mention the twin engines of Bronte's education program: Beki Dombrowe and Kimberly Johns. This pair keep the education program, including the behemoth annual skills maintenance program, running smoothly. They ensure that I, along with all of our candidates, volunteer trainers, assessors, and water safety, have everything we need to make the education program a success, along with spending countless hours on the beach themselves. A huge thank you also, to Paul Wenck for overseeing the entirety of Skills Maintenance this season and to Bronte member and trainer, Max Gonzales, who this year took on the role of Education Coordinator for Waverley, assuming responsibility for coordinating and overseeing all assessments in the area - a huge volunteer commitment.

My takeaway from my first season in this role is that while it might not take a whole village, it definitely takes a team to train and maintain a lifesaver. Thank you to everyone who has been involved with Bronte's education program this season for your commitment to the club and for your patience, understanding and flexibility in a year replete with uncertainties and challenges.

We look forward to seeing everyone back on the beach in 2022/23!



NIPPERS REPORT

In my first year in the Director role, I reflect on the extensive handover notes provided by my predecessor and I note with interest that they fail to mention tsunami warnings, east coast lows, La Nina, large marine creatures and once in 100 year floods. And yet all seem to have featured extensively during what has been a season to remember!

After significant COVID restrictions and no Under 6s last season, it was fantastic to see a full range of age groups and new nippers welcomed back to Bronte Beach on Sunday mornings. This did present some challenges as we had four groups of new parents and young nippers to integrate into our routine, rather than the usual two. But as always, our amazing team of volunteers rallied and we soon had our program down to a fine art.

We resumed our 'drop and go unless directly involved' routine which seems to be working well and continues to have a positive impact on children developing their organisational skills and resilience.

I am often asked why Nippers is so important. For me, there are three key benefits. Firstly, Nippers provides the community with competent individuals who are able to keep themselves and others safe in what can be, at times, a very dangerous aquatic environment. Secondly, we increase the number of people who are able to act as first aid responders in emergencies, whether it be in the home, school, shops or broader community. Finally, for our children it provides a community and support network outside of their peer group at school which is so important as each child navigates the challenges of transition into adulthood.

On behalf of the Bronte Nipper community, I would like to express my thanks and appreciation to the Nipper Committee and in particular Jess Stewart who worked tirelessly to deliver and support an amazing program for our children. I would also like to highlight the significant contributions made by our volunteer coaches: Ben Nixon, Al Visch, Jackson Raymond and Amy and Zac Sharma. Steve Brown has done an amazing job this year revitalising our fleet of Nipper boards with the support of a small but tight knit board-repair army, fuelled by beer and pizza. Thank you to our water safety leadership team of Tara Wynne, Grant Lyndon and Noel McLaughlin who are first on the beach each Sunday morning risk-assessing the conditions and working with the Lifeguards and Patrol to provide expert water safety quidance to our age managers.

To the 789 Nippers and supporting parents, carers and volunteers, thank you for an amazing season and I can't wait to see you down at Bronte for the start of the new season later this year.

I would like to close with a speech delivered by the Skeete Family whose son Liam, with the support of a close-knit cohort of Under 14 boys, graduated this season with his Surf Rescue Certificate in spite of his autism challenges:

We have been so blessed over the past 10 years to be part of this community. Our lives have been impacted tremendously from the opportunity to observe, experience and be a recipient of Bronte's SLSC generosity, compassion, inclusion and friendship from the wonderful families who are part of this club

Liam's milestone this year was a massive achievement for him and a credit to the time he and his sister Lily put into training and revision, to Amber and Steve and the team for making adjustments, to those fine young cadets around him Noah, Verona and Jack and to Bruce Jones - a huge thank you - who took on the responsibility to have Liam on the team and to work with him for the proficiencies and adjust the program to ensure inclusivity.

Thank you also to Bettsy who was always on the lookout for Liam over the years and supported him from swimming with him to encouraging him at the inclusive events and giving him a massive bag of Chupa Chups each year that made him sick later that day!

It's been a fantastic journey, sometimes intense and confronting for those around him, but as they say, sometimes it takes a whole village! You have enriched our family's lives in ways that are unimaginable to many.

Today we really wanted to show our gratitude for the 9 years of fun times and the exceptional community inclusion, mentorship and leadership of the entire cohort of the under 14 boys. We would love to recognise all of them and encourage them to continue to inspire other children as well through their lives into adulthood. This year we got to see the boys' spirit in action with such a great bunch of kids and cadets who were completely on Team Skeete. We are so proud and happy for them all!

We have such gratitude for everyone who has been part of sharing their compassion and inclusion.

DIPPERS REPORT

In late January, the Club launched 'Dippers' at Bronte in conjunction with Autism Swim. Dippers is an 8-week, modified Nipper program for neuro diverse kids and is free for all participants. Dippers was developed by Autism Swim to provide water safety education to children with Autism Spectrum Disorder who, alarmingly, are 160 times more likely to drown than those without.

Our inaugural season was amazing! Each of our 10 Dippers had unique abilities and families came from all over Sydney to take part. The kids made remarkable progress: some of the Dippers experienced the ocean for the first time, some learned tube rescues, some caught their first wave, and all became much more confident and comfortable with the activities, the water, and the people involved.



For the over 20 Bronte volunteers who provided weekly water safety and support, being part of the program felt like a great privilege. It was incredible to watch the kids learn and progress and to get to know each family. It was described by one member (and felt by many!) as "the best thing I've done at the Club".

Please join us next season – it would be wonderful to watch this program grow.

In another cracking year for the Bronte Cadets, we've again enjoyed the company of $120\,13-18$ year-olds active on our patrol roster. That's over 100 kids getting out of bed earlier than is comfortable for a teenager on a Sunday morning and volunteering their time in our community. They have come to the beach every week, full of enthusiasm, respect and good burgour.

Our Sunday morning routine is now well-established, setting up the patrol tent and joining the patrol briefing, followed by training drills and swimming or paddling exercises and a couple of hours of patrol activities.

In February, over 20 of us ventured to Garie Beach for our inaugural Bronte Cadets on tour patrol. Our bus arrived at a closed beach with overcast conditions and no soul in sight, and we absolutely made the most of the afternoon. The day was packed with hours in the water practising our paddling skills, an IRB rescue, beach exploration in the ATV, an expertly prepared end-of-patrol BBQ, a game of touch football and a birthday party, not to mention packing up the beach and patrol equipment and cleaning up the clubhouse. This will definitely become an annual event.

A particular highlight this year has been working closely with the Age Managers of the younger Nipper groups to coordinate a water safety program that empowers our Cadets to support our younger members when they're feeling nervous, anxious and overwhelmed. It has been a joy to watch the Cadets embrace this opportunity to mentor the Nippers, remember how it felt when they were feeling the same, and develop strategies to support and encourage the Nippers to join in the activities in the water or on the sand. When we invited three of these Nippers to our Cadets awards ceremony to present awards, they bravely spoke to a room full of teenagers and parents. Their message, "Thank you to all the Cadets for your help. You made us feel confident and brave and ready to go in the water."

Once again, Steve Tindale has been pivotal in our program's flourishing. His dedication to training the Cadets, his level head and extraordinary competence continue to bring stability and energy to our activities.

This season concludes my tenure in this role, and as I reflect on what our youth program has achieved in the past four seasons, I could not be more proud. I know the impact of our program has been felt by individuals, at a patrol level and club-wide. The regular feedback from patrol captains, patrol members, Nippers Age Managers, parents and trainers commenting on the enthusiasm, the good humour, the skills, the respect and the dedication of our Cadets fills me with pride and confidence that we are making a difference.

Thank you to Basil and the Board of Management for your unquestioning support of our youth program. Thank you to the PCs, VCs and Sunday morning patrollers for embracing the energy that arrives on Sunday mornings. But mostly, thank you to our youth members. Thank you for your enthusiasm, patience, trust, good humour, skills, and willingness to get involved. All of these have deservedly earned you the respect of the whole Club. It has been an honour to work with each of you, and I look forward to patrolling with you in seasons to come.

SURF SKILLS AND SPORTS REPORT

The 2021/22 season was a mixed bag! With the continued focus on maintaining and improving the skills of our patrollers, and encouraging participation, we started the off-season with grand plans to launch a 5 round, cumulative points based 'Winter of Sand and Surf' competition. The focus was on friendly competition and a substantial dose of fun. Despite the vast enthusiasm for the competition, we were sadly only able to run the first round. A combination of unfavourable surf conditions and the Delta driven Covid lockdown put a premature end to our winter plans. This seemed to set the tone for much of the remainder of the season.

Early on, group training was also a victim of Covid restrictions. Fortunately, many of our members had been making the most of our extremely privileged location to get out for a soft sand run, ocean swim or paddle with one or two other club members. This meant that when training finally recommenced in early November, many had a good base to work from. For those that were keen to have a go after a break, we offered three opportunities to get 'back on boards' with a structured board skills training program run over six weeks on either Monday morning, Tuesday afternoon, or a women's only Friday morning option. Thirty paddlers completed the course under the expert direction of coaches Jackson Raymond, Noah Finnimore, and Anthony Shubitz (with a little help from the not quite expert eyes of myself and Tim Jeffries), and it felt like we were getting back into the swing of things. The feedback from participants was again highly positive, and all increased their skills and confidence in some way. I would like to say a massive thanks to our coaches for helping make that happen.

Once restrictions eased sufficiently, we were able to recommence our Tuesday Board Skills sessions under the tutelage of our very own Director of Nippers, Anthony Burrows, a very skilled and supremely calm waterman. Numbers at these sessions have been incredible, with between 25-40 people attending each week. Some days there was barely a board left available in the club, with participants arriving earlier and earlier just to secure craft. The "all welcome" policy for these sessions has been actively demonstrated with attendance by several new bronzies who were willingly supported and encouraged by experienced regular participants. This is part of the Bronte spirit that helped us win Sydney Branch Club of the Year!

Newly minted Life Member, Garry Luscombe continued his legendary "6AM with Garry" swim sessions at North Bondi on Wednesday mornings. Some sessions saw 40-50 people come down and brave the early morning to either swim across the bay or test their skills in and out of the surf zone. Encouragingly, we saw numbers increase following our skills maintenance sessions and in the lead up to carnivals, with members recognising the need to get their surf skills back into tip top shape.

Thankfully after a very successful relaunch last season, club legend and Life Member, Barry Brignell, returned to run the handicapped Sunday Surf Race. Numbers continued to be strong, with an average of 30 competitors on the start line each week and over 150 participating despite the storm and Covid ravaged season. Competition was again tight,

with members starting to figure out how to best work their handicap. Congratulations to Jenny Austin, stepping up from her second place last season to take out the competition this year ahead of Tim Nixon & Georgie Byron. I think someone needs to have a word with Barry about her handicap next year.

Monday morning 'Softies' (soft sand runners) didn't quite get back on track until midway through the season but they came home strong! Maca led by example, participating in a marathon 24hr charity run as well as many in the group training hard for the upcoming City to Surf. Bronte Joggers had yet another strong season and the Sunday afternoon run is an institution for many. It's inspiring to know that the 'Joggers' have been pounding the pavement continuously for over 50 years.

The growing appetite for surf sports carnivals, particularly amongst our "Masters" aged members, again showed the fruits of our inclusive training approach. Many were keen to test their newly refined skills in a competitive environment. Sadly however, external factors conspired against us with the majority of Masters' carnivals cancelled this season. One exception to that was the annual "Freshie Masters" hosted by Freshwater SLSC. This team based competition is one of the most hotly anticipated events on the carnival calendar, with Bronte sending a 33 member strong team including 14 first timers! Bronte came away with a highly respectable 3rd place overall! Special thanks must to Garry Luscombe and Luis Santilez for managing the team and making sure we were ready to go on the start line.

Our Branch Masters team was a little smaller than last season with the conflicting scheduling of Nippers and masters on the same day. We still formed a strong and committed team considering many of our usual competitors were not able to participate as they were providing water safety for the Nippers Branch Carnival. Conditions at Maroubra beach were massive, resulting in water events being moved to Yarra Bay but regrettably, space constraints meant Masters water events didn't proceed. Several of our competitors used this as an opportunity to have a crack at the sand events and test out their fabulous new Bronte deck coats whilst waiting most of the day for their turn on the track. The wait was made all the more challenging by the free Betty's Burgers ice-cream on offer for competitors! Congratulations to Kate Stewart on picking up a silver medal in Flags.

As the SLSNSW State titles approached, we assembled our biggest Masters team in recent memory, with 12 keen competitors putting their hand up. If we thought external factors had impacted other events however, we were in for a big surprise. Conditions in the lead-up and during the time the event was meant to proceed were nothing short of horrendous, with large swell, torrential rain, water pollution, significant sand erosion and a gastro outbreak thrown in for good measure, leading to the cancellation of the event. Whilst disappointing, we're looking forward to the opportunity next year and hope the enthusiasm carries through.

Our Surf Boats team continues to do us proud. Whilst our Masters boat crew didn't get the opportunity to defend their Australian title, our young guns made the Aussies final in



reserve grade in very challenging conditions. We were also close to fielding a third crew this year. Read all about it in the Surf Boats Report.

Thankfully the season ended on a highly positive note, with the 'End-of-Season' club carnival being a roaring success. Over 30 competitors signed up to test their skills and get bragging rights. They were put into 4 teams to contest a combination of team and individual championship races. Fortunately, we were blessed with a stunning blue sky, warm water and gentle surf conditions. The focus of the day was well and truly on having fun but the competitive spirit was also clearly on display. Thank you to everyone who got involved, either as a volunteer, participant or both! It was definitely the perfect way to close out the season.

Congratulations to all of our Club Champions - Surf Race: Kate Stewart & Felix Jander. Board Race: Kimberly Johns & Colin Gibbons. Sand Sprint: Olivia Rosewell & Daniel Webb. Flags: Olivia Rosewell & Jackson Raymond. Congratulations to Al &

Jade Visch, and Al & Flynn Visch who took out the inaugural Family Board Rescue titles in the Adult + U13 and Adult + Over 13 categories respectively. Flynn was given a wildcard entry to the Over 13 event this season. I anticipate this will be a hotly contested event for years to come.

Despite a year of ups and downs, the energy and enthusiasm for both personal development and more importantly, supporting others has never been more at the forefront. I am exceptionally proud of our Club members and extremely proud to be a Bronte Surf Club member.

He's always in the water, out the back on a board, quietly encouraging the kids and making sure that no nipper is ever left behind. It's an incredibly hands-on role – thank you Al for bringing such dedication to it.

OUTSTANDING VOLUNTEER AWARD: HUGH WEBSTER

Over the last two seasons, Hugh has taken the Chief Gear Steward role to the next level for Patrol and IRB operations. Hugh is responsible for overseeing the annual SLS Gear Inspection process at the start of each season: a mammoth task that takes most of the 'off season' to achieve.

He has done so tirelessly in an incredibly professional and inspirational manner by personally attending to gear checks and repairs and co-ordinating other volunteers. His simple, weekly practice of updating the PC-VC and IRB chat groups with status and pictures has ensured a higher level of both awareness and care by the Patrols.

In his spare time, Hugh has been instrumental in helping Bronte respond to the floods and Search and Rescue callouts at speed with quality gear, ready to go 24/7. Hugh's efforts include not only preparing for, but also attending, the 2021 and 2022 floods and local callouts at a moment's notice.

His duty of care and 'can-do' attitude have ensured the #trainhard-rescue easy and Bronte First mottos are lived up to and often exceeded.



Paul has been a dedicated member of the club for over a decade now - in that time he has racked up more than 1000 patrol and water safety hours. Since becoming a trainer in 2019, he has led at least one Bronze Medallion course every season; a huge time commitment, most of which is not reflected in his impressive hour tally!

As a trainer, Paul leads by example. He is always expanding and improving his life saving skills and his regular participation in the Club's board training and fitness groups, as well as surf lifesaving carnivals, means he epitomises the credo 'train hard, rescue easy'. What makes Paul particularly exceptional as a trainer is his level of preparation for every session and his flexibility in their delivery. Never has this been more important than in the 2021/22 season.

Paul's February Bronze Medallion course faced some noteworthy obstacles. Covid's Omicron variant was running amok in the Eastern Suburbs and Paul rose to the challenge of juggling candidates in isolation and Covid safety more generally. This course also coincided with "a little" rain and swell - indeed, it was some of the worst rain and surf conditions Sydney has ever experienced.

Paul's flexibility and dedicated advance- planning ensured his candidates were able to complete their training, irrespective of Bronte's conditions. His organisation and nimble approach guaranteed his candidates could get in the water at whichever local beach had the best conditions on the day and made certain his 2022 Bronzies were well-prepared to impress their assessors. Paul's advocacy on their behalf ensured their assessment happened on time, saving the stress of uncertain postponement.

Paul passes on his experience as a Nipper parent, an official, a patroller and a Patrol Captain to his Bronzies, as well as the up and coming trainers he mentors. He inspires them to approach their new roles with enthusiasm and to seek out ways they can support the Club on and off the beach. We are so lucky to have Paul on the Education team and it is only fitting that his efforts are duly recognised.

Kimberly is Director of Surf Sports and Skills and helps deliver the Back on Boards program. Pali has also committed extra time beyond the flags as a previous key member of the Club's building committee, working selflessly with the community and council stakeholders. Paul is a Lead Trainer, as well as the co-secretary of the Club's Fundraising Foundation. Matt Johnston is on the Club Grievance Committee.

As Club Captain, I could not be prouder of the values, skills and commitment this Patrol brings to the Beach and Club as a whole, and as such, count most as true, dear and close friends who save and enrich lives both between and beyond the flags!

LIFESAVER OF THE YEAR: VANESSA POWER

The Patroller of the Year award is a peer-voted award that recognises a positive, proactive lifesaver who has earned the respect and admiration of their fellow patrol and Club members. As a Patroller, Vanessa goes beyond what one expects of a typical patroller. RESCUE OF THE YEAR: JACKSON RAYMOND & RYAN 'WHIPPET" CLARK

Jackson was catching waves on his racing mal in very large surf between Bronte and Tamarama beaches when he noticed a surfer get knocked off his board by the lip of a sizable wave. When the surfer returned to the surface, he was in obvious distress and significant pain. When it was safe to do so, Jackson paddled over to the surfer and secured him on his board. It was obvious that he had sustained a significant injury to his leg – either a serious dislocation or break. Ryan was surfing nearby and paddled over to assist. Ryan started paddling the surfer back towards shore on Jackson's board, where Waverley Council Lifeguards had been alerted to the incident. They signalled to take the patient further offshore to safely await assistance from the Lifeguard jetski. Jackson and Ryan secured the patient by supporting his leg on Jackson's board and provided reassurance. On arrival of the jetski, they assisted in getting the surfer onto the jetski for transport back to Bronte Beach where Waverley Council Lifeguards managed treatment of the patient until the ambulance arrived. The ambulance officers attending diagnosed a suspected compound fracture and transported the patient to hospital. Well done to both Jackson and Ryan for getting the patient safely back to shore in such challenging conditions - you did us proud!



CADET OF THE YEAR (13-15 YEARS): ZOE TINDALE

Since graduating with her SRC in December, Zoe has clocked up over 60 patrol hours! She is a keen participant in Sunday morning skills development sessions, learning new skills and developing her abilities as a surf lifesaver. Her enthusiasm is contagious and she actively encourages her peers to join her in the fun.

Zoe is a respectful and considered communicator, effectively translating between regular patrol members and the Cadet patrol team and helping to build an environment of mutual respect and trust on the beach.

Whilst Zoe has patrolled for less than a season, she has sought and encouraged her peers to seek out opportunities for involvement in the Club, particularly on the beach while on patrol. Being among the most junior cohort in any environment can often discourage or inhibit initiative and stepping up. With Zoe's leadership from within their ranks, our youngest youth members have been motivated to extend themselves, make themselves available where they might otherwise make themselves scarce, and engage with the members of the Club across all ages. Zoe has demonstrated how to bridge a perceived gap between the junior, youth and senior Club, helping us to create an environment where all Club members are welcomed, respected and encouraged to excel.



This award recognises years of dedication, hard work and selflessness by two people with huge hearts. Amber Brown and Steve Tindale are a truly dynamic duo who have both made significant individual contributions that have combined to transform the experience, engagement and sense of belonging by Cadets and Youth within the Club.

As Director of Cadets, Amber could have set the vision and expected others to deliver on it. Instead, for the past four years she has been on the sand and in the water every Sunday of patrol season, working alongside Steve in leading the cadet patrols and engaging with the Sunday morning patrols. This collaborative approach has changed the perception of cadets from being on the beach to 'collect coffees' to being valued, competent, lifesaving team members. Amber's knowledge, experience and wonderfully unflappable demeanour, coupled with a gift of relatability to our teens, quietly commands their respect and that of their parents and the wider Club membership.

Complementing Amber's contribution is Steve's dedication to training and our Cadets' personal development. Steve has, for the past 3 years, trained both the SRC and Cadet bronze groups, instilling excellent lifesaving skills, facilitating and encouraging teen fitness as well as generously imparting his strong water skills. His talent for challenging and supporting the cadets to become better water men and women is a sight to behold and the results speak for themselves.

Through the sustained, combined efforts of Amber and Steve, our Cadet and Youth membership is at an all-time high and we are immensely grateful to them both.









JUNIOR OF THE YEAR (15-18 YEARS):: VERONA BATES

Verona joined Bronte as an U6 Nipper and she has been a dedicated surf club member throughout her Nippers and patrolling career, quietly doing her best at all times and encouraging those around her to do the same.

Verona is an enthusiastic and innovative member of our Youth Leadership team and provides indispensable support and feedback to the Director of Cadets and Juniors. Now an experienced patroller, Verona is an invaluable peer leader on our Cadet patrols, mentoring younger team members, leading by example and supporting the Cadet coordinators and PCs on the beach.

FINANCE MANAGER'S REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the audited financial report for Bronte Surf Lifesaving Club ("the Club") for the year ended 30 April 2022. The Club's results have improved from the prior year, despite the impact of COVID-19 lock downs from late June 2021 to mid-September 2021 and wet weather during the Club's summer season.

FINANCIAL RESULT

The Club reported a surplus of \$52,112 for the year ended 30 April 2022. This was a welcome improvement on last year's reported deficit of \$81,145. The prior year deficit was impacted by COVID-19 restrictions on the Club's operations and a large provision for legal settlement costs.

Club revenues improved by 14% from the prior year, after excluding the effect of specific COVID-19 government stimulus and assistance payments. Key drivers of this improvement in revenue are explained below.

- Subscription & joining fees increased to pre-Covid levels following a reintroduction of under 6 nippers. Other subscription & joining fees remained consistent with the prior year which is pleasing and points to the Club's ability to continue to engage with and retain its membership base.
- Bar sales and Hall Hire income improved this year but are yet to return to pre-COVID-19 levels. Income generated from functions was adversely affected by the three-month lockdown between June and September 2021 during which no functions (including Sunday Sips) were held. This was followed by a slow return to normal operations in October 2021.
- Merchandise sales were significantly higher
 than the prior year. This was a direct result of a
 large increase in merchandise offerings this year
 following the impacts of COVID-19 on stock
 levels and sales in the prior year. Additionally,
 the merchandise stall was back to normal
 operations on Sundays during the Nipper season
 following significant interruption from COVID-19
 restrictions in the prior year.
- Partially offsetting these revenue gains was the loss of revenue from the Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim. Due to poor weather δ surf conditions, Club management made the decision to defer the swim from its scheduled date in March 2022 until December 2022. No entry fee or event sponsorship revenues have been recognised this year. All entry fees collected by the Club this year will be recognised in next year's results when the event has occurred.

Broadly, expenditure increased in line with associated revenue streams with the exception of the following:

- Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim expenses that were incurred prior to the decision to defer the event are included in the financial result.
- Employment expenses have increased as a result of some general remuneration increases in line with inflation and the employment of an additional part time staff member to assist with Club administration duties.
- The higher IRB and Board, surfboat and ski expenses reflect the purchase of new IRB equipment and rescue boards that are funded directly by grants received by the Club.
- There were no COVID-19 related expenses incurred this year, these costs were significant in the prior year.

FINANCIAL POSITION

This year's surplus result has enabled the Club to maintain its reserves at \$2.35 million. Cash reserves as at 30 April 2022 are \$1.8 million. Consequently, the Club remains in a strong financial position this year.

The Club will continue to maintain prudent reserves to fund future club activities, particularly the Club's renovation plans and any unforeseen circumstances.

The Club would like to thank its sponsors and donors for their continued strong support throughout this year. As always, it is only with their generous support that the Club is able continue to provide important lifesaving services to our community and to develop our future surf lifesavers through the delivery of our nipper programme.

I commend the accounts to the members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

The financial statements cover Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and domiciled in Australia.

1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Board of Management have determined that Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the "Association") is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the Board members, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Association's Board members, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991, the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012, the Association's Incorporation Act NSW 2009 and the Association's constitution.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies described below and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB1048 Interpretation of Standards and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

Other than those accounting policies and disclosure standards referred to above, no assessment has been made as to whether the financial statements comply with all Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

INCOME TAX

No income tax is payable by the Association as section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 exempts charitable institutions from income tax.

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred.

Generally, the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of finds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

Subscriptions

Membership subscription income is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered and corresponds to the satisfaction of performance obligations and transfer of control to the customer.

Amounts received in advance are recognised as deferred income and credited to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the expected subscription period.

Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset.

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligation is satisfied.

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which



have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of the benefit.

INVENTORIES

Inventories comprise goods for resale. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the Association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

IMPAIRMENT OF NON FINANCIAL ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from the asset or CGU.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or a period deemed appropriate for the needs of the Association.

Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities under borrowings.

TRADE AND OTHER RECEIVABLES

Trade receivables are recognised at original invoice amount less any allowance for uncollectable amounts. An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the Association will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

TRADE AND OTHER PAYABLES

Trade and other payables are carried at their invoiced cost and represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of the recognition of the liability.

PROVISIONS

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable than an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

COMPARATIVES

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.
