

Our volunteers have been patrolling Bronte Beach for 120 years and we have a record of no lives lost between the red and yellow flags which we are extraordinarily proud of.

The 11th of April 2024 was a milestone in the history of Bronte Surf Club, with the development approval from Waverley Council to proceed with the Project to rebuild the new, mixed-use council-owned building incorporating the Surf Club and front-line services, Lifeguard Service, Council Park maintenance staff and public amenities.

It has been a massive undertaking by President Basil Scaffidi, Dave Finnimore, Kimberly Johns, and the project team, and we give our heartfelt congratulations to all involved. This has been a long journey taking almost 10 years since first proposed by Basil. We thank Basil for his determination, perseverance, and passion. We all need to help contribute to the project to ensure its success.

I believe that Surf Life Saving teaches our youth to believe in themselves and know they can overcome any challenges.

Our patrolling members have been unbelievable this season and ensured the safety of the public who visited Bronte Beach. A number of patrolling members were involved in out-of-patrol hour rescues, which is an ongoing issue for the Bronte community and Waverley Council to address.

We delivered and celebrated several community activities, Rainbow Day, International Women's Day, Anzac Day and the Bronte Dippers program and we congratulate all the members involved

We also delivered a fantastic Bondi to Bronte Ocean swim which continues to be the most iconic swim on the ocean swim calendar. There were 2,300 registrations across the 1KM, 5KM, Junior Ocean swim and Macquarie B2B. We thank the 300 volunteers involved in making the event possible. We are also proud of the work of our B2B charity partner the Kids Cancer Project.

Bronte Surf Club is in very good shape and extremely well led by President Basil Scaffidi, the Board of Management and leadership team, our General Manager, Kimberly Johns, and the dedicated office team.

Thank you to all our wonderful members, for your passion and service over the course of the 2023/2024 season and we all look forward to contributing to the development of our new home.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We as a Club never take for granted reporting 'no lives lost'. Tragically, this season, while we didn't lose any lives during patrol hours, on Sunday 10 March 2024, a swimmer was caught in the infamous Bronte Express at dusk. Despite an extensive water search, initially by club members, and then by police and SLS support helicopters, he remains missing.

On Sunday 13 April, the shocking attacks at Bondi Junction occurred. We lost member Jade Young and not only the Club but the whole community felt the impact. We were also affected by the passing of Dawn Singleton through her stepbrother Jack, a nipper Äge Manager, and Ash Good, a regular on our beach and in the Bronte ocean pool. Life in our community has forever changed.

As to our season, thank you to all of our volunteers and we also appreciate the continuous support of the Waverley Council lifeguards. The wonderful collaboration has never been more important after a summer of many after hour rescues. I would like to acknowledge the efforts of local surfers in playing an important role in these rescues.

This year we had 84 rescues and 11,682 preventive actions. Lifesaving remains the core of our Club and we continue upskilling our lifesavers and education capabilities. It is the highest of our priorities and the Club is proud of our strong lifesaving base. We are also proud of the continued importance we place in growing women in leadership roles in our Club and promoting an inclusive culture.

After many years of hard work, we achieved our DA approval. This is a really important milestone and I want to thank everyone for their support. At the time of this report we are working to finalise the detailed design, appoint a main contractor and commence construction of temporary accommodation. This will house both the Surf Club and the Waverley Council Lifeguards and Park Staff for the duration of the new build.

We have commenced the important task of raising funds for the new building. Thank you to Niamh Lysaght for overseeing this critical objective. Our members' support is important and is very much appreciated.

Thank you to the many people who have contributed to our successful season. Firstly, to the Board of Management, Paul Wenck (Club Captain), Aaron O'Sullivan(Cadets), David Jones (Surf Sports), Anthony Burrows (Nippers), Betsy Rumble (Education), Sophie Paulin (Communications and Sponsorship) and Dave Finnimore (Finance).

To our very special admin team who have all worked tirelessly, led by our incredible General Manager, Kimberly Johns. Thank you to Jessica Stewart (Nippers Coordinator), Tim Jeffries (Lifesaving & Member Welfare Coordinator), Lydia Boyle (Education Coordinator), Vanessa Power (Finance Coordinator) Simanda Sárno (Functions Coordinator), Tilly Teahuahu-Tána (Sunday Customer Service) and Lina Graffet (Marketing & Communications Intern). I would like to thank Parvez Ahmed role as departing Manager of the kiosk, Judy Koslowski (Merchandise), and Owen Muddie (BBQ) and to all of our bar and kiosk staff.

We salute Paul Watchman, our Club Member of the Year. Paul Wenck, recipient of the President's Award, and Anthony Burrows, the Patron's Award. Congratulations to Patrol 14, Patrol of the Year, Cooper Duque, our Lifesaver of the Year, Paul Harrington as Patrol Captain of the Year.

We have many amazing patrollers and I would like to highlight the efforts of 27 Patrollers who all recorded over 100 patrol hours, congratulations to Cooper Duque, Tara O'Reilly, Carter Duque, Jenny Austin, Anthony Burrows, Neil Hayward, Rhys Jones, Oliver Klein, Karen Du, Tom Wilsmore, Richard Stalley, Dasha Moskalenko, Colin McDermid, Paul Watchman, Morgan Green, Alastair Visch, Sven Bolomey, Kirra Finikiotis, Lydia Boyle, Ian Poulton, Marta Imaz Solarana, Cohen Parker-Burton, Jessica Stewart, Charles Boyle, Kimberly Johns, Jochen Valdeck, and Paul Wenck. In all, the club registered over 17,000 lifesaving (including water safety) hours. Amazing!

Our Education Team under the expert guidance of Betsy Rumble have excelled this year with 50 SRC's and 60 new Bronze, 74 new ART holders, 7 IRB Crew, 30 Silver and 8 new Gold Medallion holders and 6 requalifying Gold Medallion holders. We also acknowledge Jenny Austin as our Training Officer of the Year.

I want to make special mention of the incredible growth in our Cadet program, now being managed by Aaron O'Sullivan. We now have over 115 active Cadets which is an extraordinary growth from where we were some 5 years ago. Highlighted by Cooper Duque becoming our Lifesaver of the Year. It is an absolute credit to Aaron and the wonderful Cadets that we have in our program.

It was another great Nippers year led by Anthony Burrows and Jessica Stewart and their hardworking committee. Nippers, I believe, is the foundation of our Club and for many of our members, Nippers is the reason to be part of the Club. This season we had an incredible 816 nippers through the program.

Thank you to the great efforts of our IRB team, wonderfully led by Jochen Valdeck and we congratulate Sam Hunt as this year's IRB Team Member of the Year.

We have an incredible group of sponsors, led by Macquarie Bank as our major partner of the Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim. MPA continues to be a wonderful supporter and we thank Ben Ritchie, Ed Singleton and Sarah Hogan. Alex Phillips and the team from Phillips Pantzer Donnelley continue to be one of our major contributors and we appreciate their ongoing support. Thank you also to Oakberry and Chemist Warehouse.

On the Surf Sports side of our Club, we maintain a focus on providing skills training for all members with soft sand running, board skills and ocean swimming on offer. This years competition was highlighted by great Masters representation at both Branch and State, with Kimberly & Kate going back to back to win Gold in Board Rescue. Unfortunately our Reserve Grade surf boat team was plagued with injury this season. On the bright side it was great to see our esteemed Masters Team reform just in time to fly the Blue and Gold at State and Aussies.

This year's Macquarie Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim was a wonderful success. Fantastic weather and ocean conditions on the day contributed to a record 2,400 participants across the 5 course distances. Its success is testament to all the incredible support from our 300 strong volunteers.

Sunday Joggers popularity is as great as ever and we thank Morgan & Libby Green, Geoff Doble, Ally Woodford and Judy & Martin Green for their organisation. Thank you to Jimmy Stewart for his help in managing the Club gymnasium.

Our social calendar was highlighted by a number of great celebrations including the annual Summer Party. Sunday Sips crowds reached new heights and a big thank you to Kimberly and her team.

My favourite day, ANZAC Day Memorial Service, drew a big crowd. A big thank you to Pat & Jimmy Stewart and their team of helpers for providing such a great spread of food.

Special acknowledgement to Lina Graffet for her hard work in compiling this year's Annual Report.

A huge thank you to my wife Cathy and our three daughters Hannah, Sarah and Sophie who support my great love of this wonderful Club.

The Kiosk also had a facelift with a lick of paint and some new signage (thank you Amber Brown!) and a whole new crew of signage (mank you Amber Brown!) and a whole new crew of kiosk staff. Exceptional summer weather saw some of our hottest and busiest days on record. Thank you to the whole team for their hard work and good humour in spite of the endless queues. Without doubt, the best news from the kiosk was the reunion of Parvez with his wife, Ria, and daughter, Anayza, who were finally granted citizenship and joined Pav in Australia in March 2024. NEW CLUBHOUSE UPDATF

CLUBHOUSE, COUNCIL LIFEGUARDS, PARK MAINTENANCE & COMMUNITY AMENITIES

In our last Annual report we advised that the Development Application (DA) for a new community building had been lodged. After a rigorous, and lengthy review by both the Design Excellence Advisory Panel and the Sydney East City Planning Panel we were ecstatic to receive approval, with conditions, on 11 April 2024.

At the time of this report, Waverley Council is working closely with Sydney Water to meet one of the conditions of consent. This is to ensure that the heritage listed pumphouse located beside the western wall of the Club is preserved and protected during construction. The pumphouse is an essential local asset transporting raw sewage from Bronte to the WasteWater Treatment Plant at North Bondi so we need to tread lightly!

While the Council and our architect Warren and Mahoney have been progressing construction planning and approvals, the Club has been finalising the Project Agreement with Council and making plans for relocation to temporary accommodation.



In addition, we have commenced our fundraising plans for the build. At this time the Club has a shortfall of circa \$1.5 million and we will shortly be advising members of our fundraising initiatives. In May of 2024, we were delighted to be successful applicants of a \$1 million grant towards the lifesaving facilities in the new building. This grant is part of the NSW Government's Surf Club Facility Program, and was announced at Bronte Beach by the Honourable Minister Jihad Dib, Minister for Emergency Services and Dr. Marjorie O'Neill MP, Minister for Coogee. We thank both the NSW Government and Surf Life Saving NSW for their support.

From a project point of view, Waverley Council received a good number of responses to the Expression of Interest for a main contractor and shortlisted four builders. These builders will have the opportunity to tender for the project in August 2024. This is an exciting time for our Club and we will keep you informed of the demolition and building timetable once finalised

LIFESAVING REPORT

It's been another action-packed patrol season, spanning from September 2023 to April of this year. Your collective dedication to community safety has been exceptional – thank you. Over 17,200 patrol and water safety hours were logged, yielding stellar results. Throughout the summer months, patrols executed over 84 rescues and provided first aid to more than 173 injured individuals. Additionally, 11,682 preventatives were recorded, including reuniting lost children with relieved parents and caregivers.

At Bronte, visitor numbers surged this year, especially during hot summer days and holiday periods, with peaks around Christmas, New Year's, and Australia Day, at times hosting up to 10,000 people. Thanks to the commitment of rostered patrols and volunteers, crowd management remained effective, ensuring a safe environment. The increased attendance led to a rise in out-of-hour rescues, showcasing the bravery and professionalism of off-duty members. Special recognition goes to those involved in the search for the missing swimmer in February, with thoughts extended to his loved ones.

Exceptional leadership and teamwork were evident both on and off the beach, reflecting the unwavering commitment of patrol members. Gratitude extends to all involved, including patrol captains, crew members, and IRB leadership, with a special mention to Jochen, our IRB Captain, for his dedication. Congratulations to Paul Harrington for earning Patrol Captain of the Year, and to Paul Watchman for his steadfast role as Club Vice Captain.

New Bronze members have made significant contributions, with special mention to Richard, Marta, Lydia, Charlie, Ian, Karen, and Dasha for their inspiring enthusiasm.

Junior Lifesavers played a crucial role, supported by dedicated mentors like Aaron O'Sullivan and Steve Tindale. Special recognition goes to Cooper and Carter Duque, Julie Roux, and Nicolette Birkhold for their life-saving efforts.

IRB REPORT

Another season is over, and the Bronte office is chasing me again to finalise my annual IRB report. The Bronte IRB team has had another successful season with growth in team numbers to 61 team members, made up of 28 drivers and 33 crewies. Having such a strong team has allowed us to cover all patrol weekends, SLS carnivals, swim events, after hour call outs and in recent years flood support.

This year we were able to obtain a new IRB hull, which was partly funded by a Surf Lifesaving grant but also with the help of our previous IRB captain Andrew Ferguson, who supported the purchase of the hull with a generous donation. The new boat is called Karabiner and has Andrew's company logo on the bow and front sides – so thank you to Andrew.

We now have five hulls and eight engines, and this has proved useful as we have used 4–5 boats this season to cover patrols, carnivals and club swim events. One swim event that stands out was of course our annual B2B swim, for which Bronte supplied 6 out of the operational 11 IRBs – North Bondi (1), Bondi (1), Tama (1), Coogee (2).

There are many IRB team members who helped not just during the patrol but also during the off-season to ensure the IRB section runs like a Swiss watch. Thanks go to the following club/IRB members for their ongoing support of the IRB team and Bronte Surf Club.

Jason King for maintaining and repairing all engines, hulls and helping to maintain a well-functioning IRB shed, which includes auxiliary equipment and tools. Jason has also been involved in outlining the requirements for our new IRB shed/storage area to help future proof it and ensure we are protecting the environment from any type of pollution.

Tim Jeffries for once again taking care of the required fuel to make the engines run, we easily use 500–600 litres of petrol per year, which means transporting and carrying a lot of 20L fuel cans. Lydia Boyle for checking the availability of rostered drivers and crewies every week.

Bronte Office & Management for supporting the IRB section with all their needs, from logbooks, training resources, engine spare parts and tools to helping maintain our equipment.

The last big THANK YOU goes to the entire Bronte IRB team, for doing another outstanding job, providing a combined total of 1509 hours of IRB support. The team members arranged to cover all rostered sessions and the following members have 8 or





EDUCATION REPORT

The 2023/24 season has been a season of growth for Education at Bronte, both in terms of the education delivered to the Club and the Education Team itself. I am so proud of the Education Team's work this season to welcome and prepare new and old members for the challenges they may face on the beach and beyond.

From an administrative perspective, the season kicked off with the wonderful Lizzy Liersch leading the charge to organise and resource the season's Skills Maintenance program and our first Bronze Medallion course of the season. In October, Lydia Boyle, a 2023 Bronzie from that first course, dove headfirst into the Education Coordinator role and has provided amazing support across Education and other domains of Club life since she assumed the role. I am so grateful to Lizzy and Lydia for everything they do. I would also like to thank the Club for ensuring the sustainability of the Education program by providing the necessary staff to support our endeavours. The awards Education has delivered, the engagement of members in our programs and the wonderful feedback we regularly receive from our members are the dividends enjoyed from the Club's commitment to administrative staff.

This season, we were privileged to have 4 seasoned trainers lead our foundational courses: Steve Tindale (SRC), Jen Austin (Bronze Medallion and Cadet Bronze - and a worthy recipient of this year's Trainer of the Year award), Paul Watchman (Bronze Medallion), and Jochen Valdeck (IRB). These legends were supported by a collection of assessors, subject matter experts, trainers-in-training, water safety, and parents, without whom mounting these courses would not be possible. As a result of their collective efforts, we welcomed 40 new SRCs into the Cadet. program and 25 Cadets upskilled to a full Bronze Medallion, we celebrated the addition of 36 new Bronze Medallion holders to our Water Safety and Patrol Teams, and our IRB team expanded by 2 drivers and 8 crew. Thank you all!

The Advanced Resuscitation Techniques award was a focus in Education this season. Changes to the award introduced an additional First Aid/CPR pre-requisite, and members holding old versions of the award were required to "upgrade" their awards. 103 members received their First Aid/CPR certificates through the Club, and 74 members received the new ART award. To further address the changes, we now incorporate both First Aid and ART in the Bronze course, ensuring our newest lifesavers are some of the best-prepared members of their patrols. Further, in the spirit of continuing education, we offered a drop-in session for ART award holders to practice their skills with and ask questions of professionals - thank you to Anne De Groot and Courtney Tallon for supporting the delivery of this program, which we hope to continue in 2024/25.

Our pipelines for the higher Branch-delivered awards - Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue, Silver Medallion Patrol Captain and Gold Medallion - were pumping this season. Thank you to all the members who put in the time and effort to achieve 6 SMAR, 23 SMPC and 8 new Gold Medallion awards. These awards ensure the Club's leadership pathway is robust and demonstrate the high level of engagement and commitment the Club enjoys from its active members.

Finally, we welcomed a host of new, fully endorsed and probationary trainers onto the formal component of the Education Team. A total of 3 members collected the trainers' award ensuring that our education program is sustainable into the future.

It has been a great season for the broad Education Team, which, from my vantage point, includes everyone in our Club who contributes to Education's success, as well as the wonderful volunteers of the Sydney Branch who assess and facilitate courses at all levels. The skill, effort, and commitment of all of these people in training quality lifesavers are extraordinary, and as a club, we are so grateful for all of their contributions.

NIPPERS REPORT

With over 825 enrolments before the season started, we knew we were in for a big one, and the 2023/4 season did not disappoint! It was great to enjoy plenty of safe water conditions and warm water on Sundays and see nippers and parents alike improving their confidence in the surf.

This season we chose to focus on a number of key objectives which included, as always, the safety of our kids and volunteers in the water, fostering a culture of surf craft care, spreading the load amongst our hardworking volunteer network and exploring our surroundings, including our neighbouring beaches, where conditions allowed. It was inspiring to see the age managers take on these focus areas to help develop well rounded junior lifesavers in training for our community.

This season the Under 13s and Under 14s enjoyed a special collaboration with the NSW Water Police. Over half a dozen lucky Under 13 and Under 14 youth and three adult supervisors participated in the event on a Sunday in mid-February. The party boarded a 20 metre police boat at Rose Bay with paddle boards and then toured Sydney Harbour before transiting out Sydney Heads and around to Bronte. During the transit the youth had a chance to discuss with the police their role on the water and how Surf Life Saving and the Water Police can work more closely together.

Running on rotation through the Waverley clubs each year, management of the Waverley Shield carnival is a mammoth logistical challenge. This year the challenge fell to Bronte. Under the leadership of Neil Hayward and with a detailed handover from our friends at North Bondi who ran the carnival last year, Bronte put on a great show at North Bondi for over 1000 competitors. We were saddened to see the loss of a life during an evening incident in the Bronte Rip late in the season. I would like to thank those nippers and parents who assisted with the search on the night and during the days that followed. At the end of season event, I implored the nippers present to share the water safety knowledge they have gained during their training with the general public during the off season. If they do see any non- competent people swimming outside the flags, they are urged to have the courage to say something to keep everyone safe at our beach.

On behalf of the Bronte Nipper community, I would like to express my thanks and appreciation to the Nipper Committee and in particular Jess Stewart who worked tirelessly to deliver and support an amazing program for our children. I would also like to give a special shout out this season to those parents who volunteered to officiate at the various carnivals. Your long hours on the beach, often missing seeing your own kids compete, allowed Team Bronte to participate and enjoy all the highs and lows that come with suf carnivals.

We are excited to be working towards a new chapter at Bronte following the approval of the DA for our new clubhouse. I look forward to working with the Nipper community to maintain our culture and momentum during this period of transition.

DIPPERS REPORT



AUTISM SWIM

Run in partnership with Autism Swim every summer, Dippers is a modified nippers and surf education program. Dippers inclusively welcomes individuals of all ages and abilities.

Bronte's third season of Dippers was a resounding success. Seeing 'our' children returning to Bronte with a mixture of excitement and trepidation - after a ten month break - was affirming and moving. Observing the way the children's capacity to engage more fully with this modified nippers programme was deeply gratifying.

Each session commences on the sand with stretching – often led by one of the older children in the programme – that usually morphs into an unruly hokey pokey. This is followed by a hectic 'flags' session which progresses to a rowdy, high stakes tug of war. Having Bronte's national living treasure, Col McDermid, with us putting the kids through their paces in flags was a very special treat.

We progress from sand activities to the Bogey Hole, where our kids develop their skills in amongst members of the Bronte community. Our kids paddle foam rescue boards, catching those lovely Bogey waves when the swell is up, practise diving below the surface and then execute all manner of tube rescue. Although some of the group is more comfortable filling buckets with water, our volunteers gently try to take our dippers to the edge of their comfort zone.

Our dippers finally relocate en masse to the pool, where the 'lilly pad' is enjoyed by dippers and local children alike. Crab hunting under the sandstone overhang is now officially part of the Bronte programme. When we call time on our morning's session, there are inevitably some very sad faces.

This year, two of the Bronte Dippers, Holly and Sophie Snow, participated in their first carnival. With one of our Bronte Cadets, Liam Skeete, they competed in the State Surf Lifesaving Inclusive events at North Steyne. This was a massive milesetone for these young people, challenging themselves in the Wade, Swim and Board. Sophie won gold in the UI4 Female Swim and silver in the board race (supported by her father, Nathan). Holly won gold in the U14 Female Swim and silver in Board (supported by Bronte Nippers' Jess Stewart). Meanwhile Liam, who has been representing Bronte since he was 8 years old, achieved gold in the U17 Male Surf race, silver in the U17 Male Wade and the U17 Male Board races.

Huge congratulations to these youngsters, pushing themselves and always with smiles of accomplishment. There was not a dry eye among their families and spectators.

A volunteer who worked with one of our dippers over three seasons observed that this year - after two seasons of the boy being extremely unsettled and reactive - was finally able to fully participate in the programme and enjoy himself. Over this third season the boy progressed from trying to rescue his father in the Bogey Hole with a large bucket, to saving 'drowning' people with a rescue tube. That's one story, of many, but it beautifully illustrates both the dedication of our volunteers and the powerful impact Dippers can have on children's and families' lives.

- Leadership Development: For the first time, Senior Cadets assumed the role of Patrol Captains throughout the season, gaining valuable experience and responsibility, contributing to their leadership development within the club.
- Farewell and Welcome: This season we bid farewell to Steve Tindale who has played a significant role in the development of our Cadets program over a number of years, and welcomed Neil Hayward who brings enthusiasm and commitment to the further development of Cadets.
- Club Champions: The Cadets capped off a great season by winning the Club carnival championships competing against Water Safety and Patrol Team. Congratulation to all competitors from all the teams on a successful club carnival.

In summary, the 2023/24 season has been another successful year for our Cadets program at Bronte Surf Club. With increased participation, notable achievements in certifications, and continued commitment to beach safety and community service, our Cadets have demonstrated the integral role they play within our club.

I extend my sincere appreciation to all our Cadets for their contributions throughout the year, to the Education Team for their support in the development of our junior Lifesavers, and to the entire Bronte Surf Life Saving community for their ongoing support and positive feedback and appreciation on the Bronte Surf Club Cadets program.

SURF SPORTS REPORT

The 2023-2024 season at Bronte has been one of growth and achievement for our Surf Sports community. With a focus on both skill improvement and competitive participation, we have built on the vision of previous seasons to foster an inclusive environment. This helps us not only develop proficient water women and men but also embrace those who simply enjoy the thrill of competition.

Our Surf Sports program includes a variety of activities tailored to enhance our members' abilities between boards, swimming, running and surfing. It also includes competition, from Opens to Masters across friendly events and the more serious Branch, State and Aussie championships.

Tuesday morning boards, led by Anthony Burrows, saw enthusiastic participation from rookies to Gold medallion holders, welcoming new paddlers. Continuing year round, many mornings would see the board racks largely bare! To enhance board skills, we introduced monthly coaching sessions with Troy Quinlan, focusing on paddling technique and fitness. Joel Bolewski also provided tailored training for both rookies and experienced competitors. With such great feedback, we plan to continue these coaching options next season for all patrolling and competing members.

The Sunday "Social" paddle, led by Paul Watchman, grew stronger this season under the guidance of (the Frank Norton Club Member of the Year), Paul Watchman, offering a gentle introduction to paddling.

After Ivan Power, JP Moorehead and Grant Lyndon competed in the Moon Island Classic, Grant was inspired to start the Thursday morning Distance Paddle group, earning Coach of the Year. He provided tailored training plans and guest coaches, leading early morning harbour journeys that built up to 3-4 hour sessions. This culminated in the Big Clarence Paddle - a race of 26km or 46km. Congratulations and thank you to the returning paddlers to the Northern Rivers region Grant, Jen "Penguin", Ant, James, Dave Finnimore, for supporting our rookies in their first Big Clarence. With Dave Beves, Dasha, Lydia, Marty and Rich and and representing Bronte Surf Club in the event! Garry Luscombe's "6am with Garry" swim sessions at North Bondi continued each Wednesday morning, gaining a dedicated following and welcoming new swimmers weekly.

Participants swam across Bondi Bay or tackled the surf zone. This season, Mark Schregardus used these sessions to train for his English Channel crossing, completing it in 11hrs 58mins with the support of Garry himself, and raising over \$20,000 for Mother's Heart Organisation.

In February 2024, Dan, Tamera and Anna took on the Rottnest Island Swim. Unfortunately the race was cancelled mid-way through with the conditions proving very difficult for the swimmers and support crews.

The Sunday Surf Race continued under the guidance of Barry Brignall. Barry's handicapping had everyone working hard all through the season to earn their way up the top 10 each week... well at least that's how it felt for me! Testing both swimming speed and surf skills, the course changed each week to suit the conditions. Troy Stewart generously provided additional surf race training and all swimmers improved throughout the season. There was one competitor who consistently performed, to rightfully take the trophy – Charlie Bonne-O'Gorman! Congratulations also to Charlie Boyle in taking 2nd place, and Tom Wilsmore in 3rd.

Our small but mighty ski paddlers faced several challenges this season, starting with the NSW Ski Series in October from Ettalong to Terrigal. Dave Finnimore and Julie Raoux battled large swells, whales, and a 25-knot headwind. In November, Ally Woodford and Julie Raoux competed in the World Ocean Ski Championships in Perth, completing the 20km race with impressive placements of 89th and 98th overall.

Bronte's soft sand running gained popularity this season, thanks to David Krantz partnering with Bondi SLSC runners. Despite the intense sessions, participation grew weekly. Next season, they aim to compete in Branch and State events, the Wanda soft sand running championships, the Bondi Blue event, and field teams for the City to Surf and Sydney Marathon/10km run.



Anne De Groot kicked off Women on Waves this season, creating a supportive surf community for Bronte women of all abilities. They enjoyed Friday and Saturday morning surfs at Bondi and Bronte, with occasional trips for quieter waves.

Having such a strong board riding pedigree with Aussies champ Poppy, Branch champ Sophie all the way through to the WSL Head of Competition, Jessi, Bronte provides a fantastic training ground for board riding.

Bronte competed in Opens and Masters events this season. Masters participated at Freshwater, Palm Beach, Cronulla, Branch, State, and Aussies championships, with Worlds in August. Opens competed in the SLSS Triple Crown, Branch, and State championships. The Freshwater Masters saw the debut of "Team Social," who energized our largest team of 29 competitors, enjoying the gentle surf and good fun.

The Masters team honed their skills at Palm Beach and Cronulla Masters in preparation for Branch and State. With 21 competitors at Palm Beach, we outperformed our Waverley counterparts. Returning to Cronulla Masters, our team of Kimberly Johns, Tara Wynne, Tim Jeffries, and I won our group. Special mention to Nicola Caprino for running in the Taplin events, despite not being allowed in the water!

Sydney Branch championships was held by Maroubra SLSC this season, with a mix of conditions. While Charlie Bonne-O'Gorman and Olivia Rosewall in the Opens battled solid swell and miserable weather, the Masters had sunshine and perfect 2-3ft offshore waves! Bronte punched above our weight with gold medals to Tara O'Reilly (2km run) and Tim Jeffries (2km run), plus Tim and I (Board Rescue), silver medals to Joanna Haddock (2km run), Tim Jeffries (board), Charlie Boyle (surf race), the women's swim team (Kate Stewart, Gaby Naher and Christina Lawrence), the men's swim team (Tim Jeffries, Charlie Boyle and I), Bronze to Pablo Ontivero (sprint) and Kimberly Johns (board).

Bronte's strong board riding history continued at the Branch championships, with Bronte taking silver overall, with only a team of three! Rob Angus won the Masters and a Bronze in the Opens, and a gold to Sophie Sheehan while competing up a level in the Opens! Jacob Sheehan also had the highest wave score of the day. Thanks must also go to Adam Morrison for taking the lead on the board riding competition, despite his own son not being able to compete this season! State championships were held again at Queenscliff. The team of eight competitors were met with very solid surf – the beach was closed immediately after the event! We took on the best in the state and had some fantastic results – Kimberly Johns and Kate Stewart defended their gold medal in the Board rescue, silver for Troy Stewart in the surf race and Troy Quinlan in the 2km run and bronze for Tim Jeffries and David Krantz in the 2km run.

Aussies were held on the Sunshine Coast this season, attended by Trish Ford, Cristina Lawrence, Poppy O'Reilly, Ben Nixon and the Berserkers masters crew. Poppy won gold in the U15 board riding with the two highest wave scores in the final, and Trish had her best ever Aussies with 3 silvers on the beach!

The season ended with a modified club carnival due to large surf conditions. Despite the favorites on paper being the Water Safety team, the event included a mix of land and water competitions like flags, sprints, and the Timbo relay. Charlie Bonne-O'Gorman's Cadets team proved that performance on the day is what counts, emerging victorious in a competitive field.

Special thanks to our officials, Lina Graffet and Ian Jones, whose dedication allows us to participate in Branch, State, and End of Season events. We are extremely grateful for their commitment and support!

Thanks also needs to go to Lydia Boyle for coordinating our end-of-season club carnival and board training throughout the season. Lydia's energy and passion were instrumental in helping Surf Sports achieve our season goals!

The 2023-2024 Surf Sports season has been a remarkable journey. Our goals were to enhance leadership in our weekly activities, expand training options, and increase carnival participation. I'm pleased to report significant progress, setting a solid foundation for next season's leadership. Our members' achievements highlight the strength of our supportive community. We're excited to build on this momentum and continue supporting our members in and out of the water in future seasons!



This award, initiated in 2022, recognises nippers, cadets or teams who go out of their way to support and inspire other nippers in the Bronte Surf Club community.

This year's recipients are Roise, Sophie and Xander for their contribution to the Bronte Dippers program, run in conjunction with Autism Swim. The program gives children who may not otherwise be able to take part in Nippers, the opportunity to learn how to be beach safe and to build water skills.

The Dippers program works hard to counter the following, shocking statistics:

- more than 50% of children with autism wander, often towards water;
- they are 160 times more likely to drown than their neurotypical peers;
- accidental drowning accounts for 91% of deaths reported in children aged 14 and under with autism.

Dippers also gives kids and parents a chance to connect with each other, while building water skills and learning about the particulars of Bronte Beach.

Roise, Sophie and Xander brought enthusiasm, joy, care and attention to each of the Dippers they assisted during this season's program. Ever attentive and vigilant, they also radiated a youthful sense of fun which was particularly relatable to the kids. It was wonderful to see the Dippers looking up to these cadets, trusting them, copying them, learning from them, and thoroughly enjoying their time in the water with such mature teens.

Beyond empowering the kids, these cadets helped to give confidence to the parents that there are outstanding young people, keen to help their kids at the beach and educate them around water.

RESCUE OF THE YEAR

NEIL HAYWARD, MARTY LEFRANCOIS, JAMES MCLENNAN, TARA O'REILLY & TROY STEWART ON 13TH JANUARY

During season 23-24, Bronte Beach experienced a significant increase in visitor numbers, particularly late in the evenings during the hot summer holiday period. Unfortunately the surge in crowds led to a rise in out-of-hour rescues by volunteer lifesavers, lifeguards and surfers. These rescues often occurred between 7:00 pm to 8:30pm, after official lifeguard duty hours and well after the red and yellow flags were down.

While it is important to acknowledge that members of the public are responsible for their personal decisions, unfortunately many poor swimmers chose to swim at Bronte in the evenings when this dangerous beach is unpatrolled. Despite numerous warnings and efforts from volunteer lifesavers, surfers, off-duty lifeguards and members of the community, countless incidents of individuals getting into trouble in the water at Bronte persisted.

The Rescue

A particularly notable incident occurred on Saturday 13 January 2024, when multiple rescues were performed by volunteer lifesavers and lifeguards after official duty hours. Despite warnings from lifeguards about dangerous conditions and the absence of supervision after 7:00 pm, several individuals continued to swim. This disregard for safety resulted in four swimmers being swept into deeper water by a rip current, necessitating immediate rescue efforts by local volunteers and surfers.

Club member, Troy, was one of the first to respond, spotting members of the public in distress from his balcony and running down with a surfboard to paddle out and rescue multiple patients with the aid of Neil and other local surfers. Before entering the water, Neil messaged the Club's Board and Surf Skills WhatsApp group to raise the local alarm for more assistance. Club members James, Tara and Marty, responded immediately to the callout and associated messaging. Acting in a dual role as the on-scene Duty Officer, James Mclennan began triaging the critical patients and escalating the situation to Police and Ambulance services. In parallel, Tara, Marty and Neil grabbed essential Oxygen, Defibrillation and other First Aid equipment from the Club. As a team, they provided advanced first aid critical care to the four patients on the beach, with two patients slipping in and out of consciousness.

Throughout the incident, the team prioritised and rotated two oxygen units between the four patients to ensure they supplied oxygen to the patients most in need. The team enlisted and managed members of the public to assist with keeping the patients warm and conscious, and with identifying family, friends and witnesses to gather essential background information on the incident and the patients.

Members of the team liaised with Police, Fire and Rescue and the Ambulance Service . The team then conducted comprehensive IMIST AMBO handovers of the four patients to NSW Ambulance Advanced Care Paramedics.

What stood out from the initial rescue and notification, right through to the successful handover of four stable patients to Ambulance services, was how quickly the Club and community members reacted after-hours, and the way they pulled together and worked to ensure a very positive outcome for all four patients, with no lives lost.

This speaks volumes in relation to our members' continued commitment to keeping their skills current, and their vigilant duty of care for the public. This event is but one of many selfless actions which typify the engrained "train hard - rescue easy" ethos, underpinning our successful Life Saving Operations capability, and which is, more often than not, called on to respond at any given time on any given day.



SURF LIFESAVER OF THE YEAR



Cooper's contributions to surf life saving are remarkable and this is the first time a Cadet has won this prestigious award. At the time of his nomination, only one other member of the Club had logged more patrol hours this season, highlighting his unwavering dedication.

Cooper is an exemplary member of our Cadets program, distinguished by his exceptional engagement and dedication. After completing his Bronze Course at the earliest possible opportunity, he became a member of the 100+ Hours Patrol Club - a feat that few adults even achieve each year.

His enthusiasm for surf life saving is contagious, inspiring his peers to approach their duties with similar passion and commitment. Whether it's arriving early for patrols, participating in training sessions, or volunteering for club events, Cooper's dedication is evident. Despite the serious responsibilities, he brings a sense of fun and camaraderie, making him a valued team member and fostering a positive, cohesive spirit within the club. He has run a Cadets patrol as Patrol Captain, one of the youngest to do so, and was involved in one of the more contronting first aid incidents on our beach this year. A notable example of Cooper's dedication occurred during a patrol with Patrol 1, Cooper found himself confronted with a very serious first aid incident involving a severely bleeding patient. Despite the gravity of the situation, Cooper remained calm, focused and decisive. With the support of adult patrol team members, he took swift and decisive action, stemming the bleeding and applying first aid that undoubtedly saved the person's life. This courageous and selfless act epitomises Cooper's exceptional dedication to the principles of surf life saving and makes him a worthy nominee for Lifesaver of the Year.

His actions in the rescue had a profound impact, contributing to a life being saved and setting an example for other Cadets. As part of our 100+ Patrol Club, Cooper inspires and encourages other Cadets to strive for the same achievements and dedication.

FINANCE REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the audited Financial Report for Bronte Surf Lifesaving Club ("the Club") for the year ended 30 April 2024. This report is included on page 79 to 96 of the Annual Report.

In line with the 2023 restructure of the Administration Team, the Board of Management appointed UHY Haines Norton as new auditors. You will find their report on page 94 to 96 of the Financial Report.

The Club achieved a strong surplus of \$260,326 this year. As at 30 April 2024, cash and term deposits totalled \$2.47 million, an increase of \$0.43 million from April 2023. The Club remains in a strong financial position as we move towards the redevelopment of our clubhouse following the approval of a conditional DA in April 2024.

Financial Result

The Club reported a surplus of \$260,326 for the year ended 30 April 2024. This is a slight increase on last year's reported surplus of \$247,145.

An unaudited presentation of the results on the following page provides a useful breakdown of the contribution of individual operating items to revenues and expenses. The comments on the financial result below should be read in conjunction with this table.

Club revenues increased by 10% this year after adjusting last year's revenue for the \$150,000 federal government building grant (the net impact of this grant was nil as the amount was paid directly to Waverley Council).

Key drivers of the improvement in revenue include:

- Membership revenue reflects another year of strong retention rates.
- Event and Kiosk sales increased for the current year. Kiosk sales rose as a result of favourable weather conditions over most of the high season and price increases driven by inflation. The Bondi to Bronte Ocean Swim event contributed to the increase with higher entrant numbers resulting from good conditions as well as continued strong participant support for the event.

- These increases were partially offset by a reduction in Functions revenue which were lower as forward event bookings were impacted by uncertainty relating to the timing of the clubhouse redevelopment.
- Sponsorship income from existing sponsors increased and the Club benefitted from the addition of one further sponsor.
- Bank interest increased as a result of improved market interest rates.

Expenditure has increased in line with the improvement in associated revenues with the exception of the following:

- Education expenses increased to provide greater support for member education. Third party training costs increased due to new requirements to provide specific First Aid training for the Bronze course and upgrades required for the new ART award.
- Nipper expenses increased due to the costs associated with the Club hosting the Waverley Shield this year, with a partially offsetting grant received from SLSNSW included in grant revenue. Additionally, nipper training costs were higher this year due to the outsourcing of training to third parties (offset by training fees charged, included in other revenue).
- Administration costs increased due to the initial recognition of a provision for annual leave of administrative staff and some general increases in administrative employment costs.
- A review of the useful lives of capitalised clubhouse and kiosk improvements was undertaken following conditional DA approval in April 2024. This led to a significant acceleration of depreciation rates for these assets (refer to page 90 of the Financial Report for further detail).
- Consultancy cost in the prior year represent the contribution of the first tranche of \$150,000 in federal government funding to Waverley Council as per the heads of agreement. The net impact of this contribution in the prior year's surplus was nil as the receipt of federal grant funding was recorded as grant revenue.

Financial position

This year's surplus continues to build upon an already strong reserves position. As at 30 April 2024, the Club has reserves of \$2.86 million.

It is important to point out that of the total reserves, \$0.24 million represent the remaining carrying value of the capitalised clubhouse and kiosk improvements. As mentioned above, the useful life of these assets has been reviewed resulting in a significant increase in depreciation rates. Assuming the redevelopment commences within less than the next 1-2 years, the carrying value of these capitalised assets at that time will be required to be written down to nil value.

Cash and term deposits represent \$2.47 million of reserves and have increased by \$0.43 million from the prior year. Consequently, the Club remains in a strong financial position.

As the Club moves closer towards the redevelopment project it is committed to a prudent and responsible approach to its financial management to ensure that Club is well placed to operate successfully during this period and beyond.

Finally, I would like to thank the sponsors, donors and supporters of our fund-raising efforts, without which our Club would not be able to provide the important lifesaving services to our community and to develop our future surf lifesavers through the delivery of our nipper programme.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL **STATEMENTS**

The financial statements cover Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a notfor-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 ('the Act').

1. Basis of preparation

The Board of Management have determined that Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the "Association") is not a reporting entity on the basis that, in the opinion of the Board members, there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs. Accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose financial report, which has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Association's Board members, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991, the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012, the Associations Incorporation Act NSW 2009 and the Association's constitution.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies described below and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB1048 Interpretation of Standards and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures.

Other than those accounting policies and disclosure standards referred to above, no assessment has been made as to whether the financial statements comply with all Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected noncurrent assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Following a review of the presentation of the financial statements of the Association it was determined that changes were required to the Income and Expenditure Statement and the Statement of Financial Position that result in a more appropriate presentation and classification having regard to the criteria for the selection and application of accounting policies in AASB 108. The comparative financial information has also been reclassified for consistency with the current year disclosures.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2. Summary of material accounting policies

A. Revenue and other income

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

1. Identify the contract with the customer

2. Identify the performance obligations

3. Determine the transaction price

4.Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations

5.Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred.

Generally, the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of the funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

Membership subscription fees

Membership fee income is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered and corresponds to the satisfaction of performance obligations and transfer of control to the customer.

Amounts received in advance are recognised as deferred income and credited to the income statement on a straightline basis over the expected subscription period.

Sales revenue

Sales revenue from merchandise, events, kiosk and functions is recognised when the goods and services have been provided.

Sponsorship revenue

Sponsorship revenue is recognised when any specific performance obligations have been satisfied or otherwise when the revenue is received or receivable.

Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset.

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligation is satisfied.

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of the benefit.

Fundraising income Fundraising income is recognised when received or receivable.

B. Income tax

No income tax is payable by the Association as section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997* exempts charitable institutions from income tax.

C. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

D. Inventories

Inventories comprise goods for resale. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

E. Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the Association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

F. Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash- generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from the asset or CGU. Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

G. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or a period deemed appropriate for the needs of the Association

Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities under borrowings.

H. Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are recognised at original invoice amount less any allowance for uncollectable amounts. An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the Association will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

I. Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are carried at their invoiced cost and represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of the recognition of the liability.

J. Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at: amortised cost

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables, cash and cash equivalents and term deposits in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

financial assets measured at amortised cost

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

• the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

K. Employee benefits

Short term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be pain when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

L. Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures

3. Critical accounting estimates and judgements

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The Association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. The Association in partnership with Waverley Council has undertaken a project to redevelop the existing clubhouse. On 11 April 2024 the development application in relation to this redevelopment was approved subject to several conditions. These conditions are currently being addressed in order to commence the redevelopment. As at the date of this report there is no confirmed project timeline. The Association is a party to the National Redress Scheme (NRS) as part of the Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA) Participatory Group on behalf of its member club. 
