PATRON'S REPORT

Congratulations to the Bronte Surf Life Saving Club, its volunteer members and supporters on an outstanding season in 2018/2019.

The volunteer Surf Lifesavers from Bronte SLSC have been patrolling our beach for 115 years. Bronte Surf Club's record of no lives lost between the flags whilst our volunteer members have been on patrol is one, which we are extra ordinarily proud.

Bronte Surf Life Saving Club is in good financial shape and our membership continues to grow. Our members are from the local Waverley community, who we educate and protect.

Our Surf Club building [Circa 1974] has been very functional, but alas, 45 years exposure to the harsh ocean elements has seen the structure deteriorate with concrete cancer and severe water penetration.

For a number of years the Senior Leadership group of the Surf Club has been working with Waverley Council, the local community and our membership to develop guidelines for a new fit for purpose Surf Club facility that meets the needs of our membership and the community and allows our Surf Lifesavers to deliver the best front line service we can for the public who visit and use our Beach.

Our President Basil Scaffidi has announced that a new building program is underway, with the Surf Club securing combined funding commitments of over \$7 million from the Federal Government, State Government and Waverley Council towards a new building with a budget of \$9 million. In addition the Club has capital reserves in excess of \$1.7 million earmarked for the project.

This has been an extraordinary effort and special thanks go to our President Basil Scaffidi and the leadership team.

The efforts in craft skills and scenario training developed by Dave Finnimore and James McLennan has seen the skills and capability of our front line Surf Lifesavers improve dramatically. This ultimately translates into our front line Surf Lifesavers being better prepared and Rescue Ready.





In my years as President, I never take for granted being able to report that no lives have been lost on Bronte beach during the season just gone.

Another incredibly busy season. With the many thousands of beach goers, we are now finding that we are not only needing to be vigilant during our standard patrol hours, but at many other times of the year as was highlighted by three rescues mid-week in late January after 7.00pm in tough conditions, that were carried out by our incredible volunteers.

I don't think we have ever been more diligent in upskilling our lifesavers and our education capabilities. It has been the highest of priorities for our club in recent years and on behalf of the Board of Management, we are proud of our incredibly strong lifesaving base.

We are also very lucky to have an incredible working relationship with the Waverley lifeguards and to see them this year lay a wreath at our ANZAC memorial service highlighted the closeness of the relationship. The Club continues to be in a very strong financial position as is outlined in the

to be well positioned for our upcoming

plans for a new building. The most significant non-lifesaving project this year has been bringing to fruition of over four years of handwork to be in a position to action a new building. As it has been well documented, the Club has entered into a Heads of Agreement with Waverley Council whereby we will look to lodge a DA later this year for a brand new building. We have been able to secure almost \$7,000,000 from the three levels of Government – Waverley Council, the State Government and the Federal Government.

There are too many people to thank, but I want to acknowledge the support from the Board of Management, Phil Leamon on our Masterplan Committee and the role Peter Butcher has played as General Manager. Thank you to David Sharma for helping us secure the \$2,000,000 of Federal money, Bruce Notley-Smith and Sally Betts for helping us secure the \$345,000 of State money and to Waverley Mayor John Wakefield, for his support in helping us secure the Waverley Council funding. A special thank you also to Emily Scott, Jordan Laverty and the whole team at Waverley Council who have been wonderful to work with.

At the time of writing this report we are about to issue a Request for Tender for the design of the new building.

We have a very special group on our current Board of Management and thank you to all of them. Roley Tyrrell (Finance), Dave Finnimore (Director of Surf Sports), James McLennan (Club Captain), Sam Stone (Education), Craig Betts (Nippers), Gaby Naher (Sponsorship) and Amber Brown (Cadets). Thank you also to Anthony Mossman as an ex-officio member, overseeing our relationship with the Board Riders and all things "Bronte".

Our administrative staff continue to work very hard for the club. Led by General Manager Peter Butcher, who has to

wear many hats in performing his role and he does it with great distinction. Thank you to the incredible job Kimberly Johns does as Lifesaving & Education Administrator and B2B Coordinator. To Holly Ries, who not only oversees our functions but has played an ever-increasing role in the running of the kiosk and to Victoria Raymond, our Nippers Administrator (and many other roles). I would also like to acknowledge and thank Tilly Teahuahu-Tana for all the wonderful work she does on Sundays. I extend a thank you and welcome to Clare Burrows who has taken on the unenviable challenge of Coordinating our Club team gear and merchandise. Thank you to our fabulous bar staff and our kiosk staff led by Jana Scott, and we also appreciate the work of Judy Koslowski (merchandise) and Duncan Horscroft, Nico and Madeleine Love on the BBQ. We salute David Stone, our

Clubman of the Year. Garry Luscombe for the Patron's Award, and with contributions too significant to single one out, Amber Brown and Tim Jeffries who were awarded the Presidents Award. Congratulations to Ruk de Silva, Rookie of the Year, Jen Austin, our Patrollor of the Year and Laura Sturt, as Patrol Captain of the Year. 

As members are well aware, it has been a life changing year for the Club. We have been able to secure all the necessary funding to now carry on with our plans to build a new surf lifesaving club. We commenced this process back in the third quarter of 2013 and commenced discussions with Waverley Council towards the end of 2014.

We have been able to secure incredible Government support from Local Government (Waverley Council), Federal Government (through the efforts of the Member for Wentworth, David Sharma) and State funding to a total contribution of approx. \$7,000,000. The Club has committed a further \$2,000,000 and we are working towards a new \$9,000,000 Club which will integrate the Waverley facilities including public amenities, a kiosk, council amenities and lifeguard facilities. We have entered into a formal arrangement with the Waverley Council and the Federal Government.

At the time of this report, a tender for the selection of an architectural firm was launched. Initial interest has been high

It is intended that decision by Council and the Club will be made by 20 August.

From that stage, we will finalise the design through community, member and stakeholder consultation. We are aiming lodge a DA in the last quarter of 2019. In the perfect world, we would look to commence construction in May/June 2020.

The building of the new Club will result in a modern, functional community club and assist us in performing our lifesaving role.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

What a season hev ...

This season delivered some of the greatest demands on the Club to perform its community-based volunteer Lifesaver role to the highest standard, on any given hour of any given day. The number of out of area visitors to our beautiful beach truly boomed this year. Social Media, with its multi-word of mouth effectiveness, was a big drawcard as #Bronte Beach #BonditoBronteWalk trended off the charts. Media rich selfie and drone posts on Facebook and Instagram created a strong FOMO pull to visit both Bronte Park and Beach, as did the amazingly warm water and long periods of perfect beach weather.

Despite countless warnings via different mediums, many visitors still chose to enter the water in locations or conditions which were way outside their capabilities. Whilst the majority of incidents occurred outside the flags, either near the Bronte Express or off the back of sand banks,

there was a disturbing increase in the number of after-hours rescues.

Bronte Surf Club Lifesavers and Lifeguards successfully performed over 24 after-hour rescues during the December to February period. Whilst this imposed some tough challenges, both teams continued to provide exceptional coverage beyond their rostered times, always going the extra nautical mile. Keen observations were followed up by non-hesitant actions resulting in the lives of countless people being saved. As a testament to the growing capabilities across the member base, Bronte Surf Club members were awarded the Sydney Branch "Rescue of the Month" on two reported occasions

This speaks volumes of our Clubs commitment to improving both our relevance and perceived valued to the community. The growing desire to engage with others at all levels, be it via open education or simply training hard

and smart as one team to rescue easy is becoming the norm. If the end cost of standing tall to ensure no lives are lost, is just a relatively small commitment of your time ... oh and a few dozen dinged boards ... then it's really no cost and all reward.

Collateral board damage aside, Bronze and Board training was my pet love this season. Some really good candidates coming through and the modular method of teaching Bronte level surf skills is paying dividends. Many have "Trained Hard and Rescued Easy" right from their first Patrol with no hesitation due to the improved confidence in their skills.

From a Patrol Operations perspective it was great to see Patrols swapping the PC-VC role around. Swapping roles and responsibilities with a considered approach ensures the necessary engagement and enthusiasm is maintained as the season often drags

on. Taking a step back to conduct peer mentoring and general up-skilling across the Patrols, including a solid push to seek higher awards, provides the required strength in depth to round out the overall capabilities year on year. Once again feedback from the Lifeguards was very positive. Engaged peer mentoring, training and hybrid rescues has become the norm as we collaborate to provide a cohesive offering to the community.

As the Clubs Board and Surf skills group's abilities grow, it's encouraging to see more Water Safety members actually doing their minimal Patrols and then some. Some legends are now electing to be a full time Patrollers as that is where the real action is at. As some background, we "officially" have 280 proficient Bronze & SRC members however only 170 fulfil the regular Patrol and IRB roles. Knowing that our Lifesaving Clubs core requirement is to provide Patrols capable of ensuring public safety, this real-world active Patrolling member anomaly needs to be flipped.

I encourage all members to not only remain highly proficient but to also align with a Patrol team and pay back where possible the efforts invested in you via the free access to quality gear and skills training. This is what your Club and community expects of you as we are first and foremost a Life Saving club after all.

Unlike other high competition or select member focussed clubs, we should never take our valued patch of sand with

benefits for granted. If we don't continue to execute and indeed exceed our core mission of ensuring community safety, then winning Gold at Aussies or Worlds is a tarnished award. Thankfully the Club is reaching a happy balance of obtaining both accolades and I applaud both management and the members for this achievement.

Speaking of Patrols, they don't just happen by chance or accident. None of our Patrolling could effectively take place without the tireless efforts of Club Vice Captain, Garry Luscombe. Garry with the remote assistance of William Schaffner is the engine room when it comes to Patrol rostering and resourcing. Garry has to continually jig and align prerequisite skills to ensure all Patrols have similar strengths and a fair allocation of hours. This is extremely challenging and time consuming given the number of public holidays that occur during the patrol season.

to be allocated with their bestie on a certain day morning and afternoon, it becomes a full-time job. On top of that Garry is actively involved with the Lifesaving Committee and somehow manages to fit in running the Wed 6am with Garry swim group which is also a very successful training avenue for new Bronzies.

I cannot thank Garry enough nor the many other key repeat offenders like Kimberly, Finn, Basil, Tim, Emma, Dom, Sam, Jochen and Vic's. Their passion

When you add in new Bronzies wanting

and often unrecognised efforts are what keeps me engaged. Those members collaboratively spend a crazy number of hours both on and off the beach to ensuring our members are respected and offered every opportunity to be challenged and be all they can be.

At the end of the day volunteers should feel happy and proud of their selfless commitment of time and effort. Be it for themselves, the community or the team, if their actions are noble, we welcome them all as one Club with open arms.

To all Club members, thank you for your service and enthusiasm this season in all aspects of Club life. Please take some time to reflect and appreciate the efforts of others who strive to ensure we are once again worthy of "Bronte First" title.

PATROL CAPTAINS' REPORTS

PATROL 1

Patrol One was delighted this year to actually have more "open" beach days than closed, a welcome change on previous years, and many of these days were accompanied by glorious Saturday morning sunshine. 



This has been a stellar year for Bronte Education with 200 candidates trained across the full range of Bronte Awards.

Over the past year we have had excellent training, a senior branch assessor said that one of our squads was the best they had seen in years. It is great to receive that feedback about our candidates - it shows we must be doing something right.

This season we had a new education strategy, repositioning education to have a much greater focus on continuing member engagement and creating pathways for members to stay in the club.

The Bronze has integrated more with the rest of the club, which has seen members patrol more hours and will hopefully start to see solid retention. This has been re-enforced by Bronzies attending the Wednesday morning swims and board training with Troy Quinlan.

The Bronze Courses have also become smaller, capped at 12 candidates. This has ensured that we have been able to better track candidates and helped groups form social bonds.

We also moved the assessments to Bronte – sometimes that meant bigger surf - but it also meant skills were developed and assessed at our beach, meaning we were more 'beach-ready' than ever before.

As part of our member engagement initiatives, Emily Harrison, has commenced as the Education Coordinator, who will support Kimberly and myself with managing education administration and member engagement, and is the first point of call. Emily can be contacted via email education@ brontesurfclub.com.au. Kimberly and Emily have supported me and the training team to ensure that we can focus on training, and are not quagmired in paperwork!

This year we started early with an August Arctic Bronze, which was a successful new initiative focussed on ensuring we had new patrollers ready for the start of season, we will continue this into next season. In addition to the usual spring and February Bronze.

There was a season of renewal with the training team this year with Ruk

and Paul Watchman stepping up to lead the February Bronze Courses. Anthony Burrows took charge of a late Cadet Bronze in May (after the end of season). This new round of leadership has continued with other new trainers coming forth – but more is needed, so get on board!

Beyond the Bronze, the Club has produced, what might be a record for Bronte – 21 Silver Medallions. This included 5 IRB Drivers – the first since 2014 - a great achievement for the club to refresh the IRB team, and 16 Basic Beach Management.

In May a number of Bronte candidates completed their Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue, and we will be looking at more candidates completing advanced awards next season

This year the Trainer of the Year was thrown into the deep end leading a Bronze Course, having just completed his Training Officers Certificate. Paul Watchman excelled with outstanding feedback from the Assessors, he demonstrated a diligent approach to training that provided candidates a fun environment to become lifesavers. Although it was without incident (see the Rip to Damascus)

Thank you to all the trainers and assessors, there are the patrol hours, the training hours, and the preparation hours, that you all put in that make our training work well.

JENNY AUSTIN - THE AUGUST BRONZE

The first Bronzies of the 18/19 season were the first group in years to be assessed at Bronte and it felt fitting indeed.

Aside from Monday & Saturday formal training with Sam, Paul, Ruk and Rvan, we benefited from additional training sessions with Dave on the boards; Kimberly, Paul, Nicolette at Garry's 6am Wednesday swims.

We were a small group of ten, hardly enough to start training mid-winter with the water temperature a very "fresh" 15 degrees. Six weeks of dedicated

attendance, practice so real we had some narrowly averted 'real' chest compressions on live patients, a little warm Fanta (Sam Stone's insider's tip for mild hypothermia) and some healthy competition in the run-swim-runs. Very well supported and coached in a safe environment but we pushed the boundaries of our comfort zones.

I was told when I arrived in Sydney from the UK that the Bronze course was a great way to meet people - I don't think I realised the extent to which the Club would permeate my life. I've been amazed with the number of volunteers who selflessly dedicate their time to train the next intake of Bronzies and upskill existing members. After one full season under the belt, many of us are looking to deepen our knowledge and sign up to further training as we look to give back to the club that has provided us so much.

TIM HEGARTY – RIP TO DAMASCUS

Our 'Bronzie' instructors constantly drill us on Rip identification and rescues. Even so, the thought of a rip rescue daunted me - I didn't have to wait long for my Road (Rip?) to Damascus moment!

Practicing tube rescues one Saturday, I'd just clipped in my patient. After 2 minutes swimming for home, I looked up and saw we'd actually gone backwards! Forgetting Rip training and thinking I was a great swimmer, my reaction was to pump the arms harder! The 'Bronte Express' just giggled, and swept us out another 10 metres - luckily instructors Paul, Anne and Ant were always monitoring nearby.

As I lay in the IRB humbled (and shoulders aching), they illustrated how to employ the Rip Survival Principles, including staying calm and swimming laterally. Another morning of lessons learned on Bronze Medallion: Keep calm, stay humble to the ocean, remember and trust your training!

A massive thank you to all the Bronte Education Team on all your efforts in training our members. To have the level of commitment you all do, on top of your regular patrolling duties and everyday lives is really something special.

On behalf on the Nippers Committee I would like to thank everyone involved in our nippers program helping make this another successful season.

We had 764 nippers register which was slightly down on last year with fewer U6's joining, but our retention rates are strong in the U9-10 age groups. We had 23 nippers graduated from U14's with their SRC qualification and commenced life saving duties. I look forward to seeing them on patrol next season. Once again Col, Marty and Kirsty managed the U6's and helped them gain confidence to enter the water and have lots of fun on the sand.

Nippers provides an opportunity for parents to be actively involved with their children in an activity that is based on skills and education. Our 'yellow cap' program is the first step in qualification and we encourage parents to do their Bronze Medallion course so they can help out as water safety, this sets a great example for children and increases everyone's skills in awareness, safety and first aid. Knowing CPR is a skill everyone should have.

Nippers is run by parents and we need people to continue to step in and help as officials, age managers, committee members or even just on the BBQ. As our nippers graduate, so do a group of experienced volunteer parents that need to be replaced. We have continued a great initiative to upskill parents on boards and there is an enthusiastic group training once or twice a week and even doing a couple of master's events, I encourage anyone with their bronze to join in: your children will be impressed.

To successful run nippers we rely on our age managers and assistants to do a great job within the limited 1 hour time slot they have each Sunday, but nippers is not a learn to swim group so we encourage all nippers to undertake swimming sessions during the week. We try to make Sunday a fun experience and will always encourage kids to enter the water to increase confidence and develop their skills. Our emphasis on Sundays is on participation in a safe environment, we are focussed on water safety which means sometimes we cannot enter the surf due to unsafe conditions. We are of course fortunate to have the pool and Bogey Hole available.

Many nippers have participated in our training and competition program. Firstly, a big 'thank you' to our coaches: Jason Gavin did a fantastic job running the advanced board squad, while Scott Doble kept the development group moving forward. Jo Mermaid continued to run our beginner group on Tuesday afternoons at Bondi. On sand Jordan continued

to develop our land based athletes with a number joining his long distance training group as well. We have established a great relationship with the Waverley Lifeguards who work at Bronte, a number of them have joined the club and have given their time to train our nippers. This year we successful ran a camp in the pre-Christmas school holidays with the support of club champion Wally Eggleton while Troy Quinlan has been providing long board training sessions.

Each year we run 2 rounds of club championships; this gives everyone the chance to see how they are progressing in the mix of events with points counted towards end of season awards. Our results in competitive carnivals across the season have been strong and a credit to the coaches and determination of the competitors. We had 150 competitors attend the Sydney Branch carnival at Maroubra 75 competitors attend the State champs this year, there is such a competitive field across every event, just making finals is an achievement. Unfortunately the surf conditions at the Branch carnival meant many kids did not get to enter water events

This year we were able to run the Junior Ocean Swim at Bronte in good conditions. We gave away a brand new Bennett nipper board and everyone had a great time. The swim is a great way to introduce the nippers to the longer format of ocean swimming with some of our U14 and former nippers all taking on the longer Bondi to Bronte swim.

A feature of Nippers is the development of Junior Surf Life Savers and it was a great pleasure to again award The Dave Finnimore award for Vigilance and Service to Lily Skeete and Leila Gaston for their Sunday evening rescue of a man in serious risk of drowning. Proving once again that our nippers are trained and equipped with the skills and confidence to take action and rescue someone in trouble.

It has been a pleasure to manage Bronte Nippers in my third year as Director and I would like to thank the committee for volunteering their time and for their hard work: thanks to Jessica Stewart. Amber Brown, Mark Braun and Jason Gavin. I would also like to thank Basil Scaffidi for his support as President of Bronte Surf Club.

Finally a massive thank you to all of our nippers who make Sunday mornings at Bronte Beach the best place to be. The smiles and laughter make it all worth-while and I am proud to see the nippers build friendships, confidence, display sportsmanship and develop into young life savers willing to serve our community.

RESCUE OF THE YEAR: TROY STEWART, WALLY EGGLETON, ANTHONY "HARRIES" CARROLL

This season the Club was awarded rescue of the month twice at Branch and State level with a third just missing out as apparently Branch & State can only award so much awesomeness in the same month.

The January 2019 "Southern Express Hillsong Highway to Hell" 7:45pm mass rescue of 8 people conducted by Club members Kel Noble, Harries, Lifeguard Jules and James McLennan was pretty epic however, their efforts paled in comparison to a rescue that occurred at 7am on the morning of the 30th of August 2018.

The graphic rescue pictures that went viral worldwide speak volumes of the courage, skill and teamwork that went into rescuing a swimmer who was literally going under in truly dreadful conditions. This all occurred whilst everyone was going about their busy morning frantic relax activities.

The rescue itself was next level.

Two of Australia's best surf rescue swimmers, Troy Stewart and Wally Eggleton, without hesitation swam to the assistance of the lady who had been pulled out of the back of the bogey hole. The swimmer was caught in a very rough southern rip screaming for help having gone under a few times. Troy made it there first, literally parting the sea of 10-12 ft sets (some say he just walked) followed by Wally with a rescue tube to secure the patient.

They were ably assisted by (in the words of one news report) a local Pilates instructor who also masquerades as a part time Lifeguard – Anthony "Harries" Carroll.

Harries quickly swapped a Pilates plank for a fibreglass one, backing the boys, after first rescuing another member of public who had tried to assist. Their efforts were solidly backed up by Lifeguard Reidy and other members of the club.

These watermen personify the "Train Hard and Rescue easy" moto as it was no easy day!

OPEN / MASTERS COMPETITOR SURF BOARD RIDER: ANTHONY "HARRIES" CARROLL

Harries flew the Bronte flag with great pride at Aussies this year, and totally dominated the 40-44 age group on the Board. He won Gold in the Board Race Final against a few ex pro Ironmen, and then 2 days later won Gold in both the Longboard and Shortboard Surfing down at Burleigh Heads, against some high quality competition. 
Because of Garry's enthusiasm, continual commitment and statesmanlike mentoring, the Club is in a better place.


FRANK NORTON CLUBMAN: DAVID STONE

- 600 apples & 700 bananas devoured

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- Only 3 minor first aids



FINANCE MANAGER'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure that I submit the financial statements, company accounts and auditors report for the season 2018/19.

Once again the club has performed very well, continuing its financial success with a positive result for the year of \$235,988.

This result along with previous surpluses over the past years places the club in a very sound financial position.

Some financial highlights appearing in this year's results are set out below.

INCOME

Total income increased from \$1,195,809 to \$1,365,704.

Some stand out areas of income were Bar Sales up from \$274,611 to \$324,492, Hall Hire up slightly from \$121,428 to \$124,357, Bondi-Bronte Ocean Swim Fees up from \$84,442 to \$99,141 (with the best surf conditions for many years).

The highlights would be sponsorship increasing from \$138,409 to \$176,654 and Donations are up from \$46,532 to \$104,050, largely thanks to the Molakai Ski Challenge that Dave Finnimore, James McLennan and Jason Gavin participated in that raised almost \$50,000 alone.

After bad weather at the beginning of the season, the Kiosk recovered with a good Christmas period and showed a slight increase in income from \$80,674 to \$82,835.

The main area where income was down were Subscriptions & Joining Fees down from \$175,425 to \$168,245.

EXPENDITURE

Expenditure was up this season from \$979,200 to \$1,129,715.

There were a number of areas with increases in expenditure, Bar Services & Expenses up from \$164,232 to \$179,688.

Hall Hire expenses increased from \$61,547 to \$117,387.

Cadet & Junior Programme up from \$3,760 to \$8,519.

Nipper Expenses up from \$68,335 to \$87,122.

Patrol Expenses up from \$19,700 to \$32,619.

Sponsorship Expenses up from \$7,299 to \$16,919.

Also Legal Costs this year were \$22,260 whereas it showed nil the previous year.

OVERALL POSITION

Members will see that once again we achieved a positive result and that Term Deposits have increased from \$1,369,717 to \$1,704,110 and Total Assets have increased from \$2,074,830 to \$2,312,753.

Our members can remain satisfied that the Bronte Surf Life Saving Club is in a sound financial position. Members should note that the Board has been aware of the need to have surplus funds added to our accumulated funds for future club activities and the club's renovation that will take place over the next couple of years.


It should be noted the club has made provisions in the accounts of \$80,000 which is made up of \$60,000 for the Masterplan, \$10,000 for Legals, \$5,000 to Training & Education and \$5,000 for Boards & Ski's.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Club's accountants, Kirk Maynard and Peter Kearns of Maynard Kearns, Club President Basil Scaffidi and General Manager Peter Butcher who put in many hours in regards to the club finances.

NOTES ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated is not a reporting entity because the Board of Management is of the opinion that there are unlikely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of financial reports tailored to satisfy all of their information needs. Therefore this financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Board, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and Associations Incorporation Act NSW 2009 and the clubs constitution.

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

The following accounting standards and significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous year unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 108 Accounting Polices, Changes in Accounting Estimates & Errors
- AASB 118 Revenue
- AASB 110: Events Occurring After Reporting Date
- AASB 116: Property, Plant and Equipment
- AASB 1031: Materiality

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

INVENTORIES

Inventories comprise goods for resale. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and are net of any rebates and discounts received.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

DEPRECIATION

The Depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

AMOUNTS OWED

Amounts owed are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less any allowance for uncollectable amounts.

An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective

evidence that the Association will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

AMOUNTS OWING

Amounts owing are carried at their invoiced cost and represent a liability for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Association becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services.

REVENUE

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Association and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specification criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

SALE OF GOODS

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers

SUBSCRIPTIONS

Revenue is recognised when a member is entitled to the benefits of belonging to the association.

SPONSORSHIP, DONATIONS & GRANTS

Unconditional sponsorship, donation & grant revenue is recognised in the income statements when it is controlled. When there are conditions attached to the revenue relating to its use for specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided.

TAXES

Income Tax

No Income Tax is payable by Bronte Surf Life Saving Club Incorporated as Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 exempts Charitable Institutions from Income Tax

Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax, except:

- where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. It is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of the expense.
- (ii) receivables and payables are shown inclusive of GST.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and short-term deposits in the balance sheet comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less plus bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities under borrowings.

PROVISIONS

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.


